ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to vacate Walter street part of Greenwood street, and certain alleys in Boyd's Subdivision of Bank Addition to the City of Enterprise, Oregon.

The City of Enterprise does Ordain as follows:

Section 1. All that certain street heretofore dedicated to the Public, and which is known and designated as Walter street, the Plat and Deed of Dedication of which are recorded and of file in the office of the County Clerk in and for Wallowa County, Oregon, shall be and is hereby vacated.

Section 2. All those alleys laid out and dedicated which lie within Blocks "C" and "D" of Boyd's Subdivision of Blocks 5, 7 and 8 of Bank Addition, according to Amended plat of said Addition, to the City of Enterprise, and also that certain alley laid out and dedicated which extends along the west side of said Blocks "C" and "D" of said Boyd's Subdivision of Block 5, 7 and 8, of said Bank Addition, as amended as aforesaid, to the City of Enterprise, Oregon, the Plat and Deed of Dedication of which are recorded in the office of the County Clerk in and for Wallowa County, Oregon, shall be and are hereby vacated.

Section 3. All that portion of Greenwood street, in said City of Enterprise, the Plat and Deed of Dedication of which are recorded in the office of the County Clerk in and for Wallowa County, Oregon, and described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at a point 30 feet North of the Southwest corner of Block 4, of an Amended Bank Addition to said City of Enterprise, Oregon, and extending thence east 600 feet in a straight line to a point 30 feet

north of the Southeast corner of Block 2 of said Amended Bank Addition to Enterprise, Oregon, thence south 30 feet to said Amended Bank Addition to Enterprise, Oregon; thence west 600 feet to the Southwest corner of said Block 4, of said Amended Bank Addition to Enterprise, Oregon; thence north 30 feet to the place of beginning, shall be and is hereby vacated.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the Mayor and publication according to law.
