#### North Country Endorsement.

C. H. Allen, principal of the Flora schools and Republican candidate for assessor, while in Enterprise last week taking the teachers examination, left at the clerk's office the original of an endorsement of himself personally and of his candidacy, that is at once unique and strong. It is signed by 102 residents of the North Country, and reads as follows:

"The North Country, Jan. 10, 1908. To whom it may concern: This is to certify that we the undersigned citizens feel that the North Country is entitled to one or more of the elective officers to be elected in June, 1908.

## Measures Voters Will Pass Upon

In addition to the names of the candidates for the various offices, Oregon voters will be confronted by 19 initiative or referendum propositions on the ballot at the June election. The plutocratic Washington (D. C.) Post is sneering at the plan to submit these proposed laws, reviews of the acts of the legislature and constitutional amendments to the people of Oregon, who it says are not intelligent enough to pass on them. This is the view also adopted by the Portland Oregonian and Pendleton Tribune. Those papers profess to believe in the supreme wisdom and incorruptibility of politicians who boss legislatures! To give the lie to the hired tools of the enemies of Oregon, every voter should inform himself to the utmost on these 19 measures, which briefly stated are as follows:

#### Submitted By the Legislature.

Amendment increasing compensation of members of the legislature to \$400 for a regular session and \$10 a day for special sessions. Amendment permitting the location of state institutions away from the capital.

Amendments increasing the number of supreme judges to five and extending the jurisdiction of circuit courts to probate; also requiring provision by law for district attorneys, county courts, etc. Amendment changing the time of holding general elections from June to November.

#### Legislative Acts Submitted Under the Referendum.

Acts giving sheriffs custody of prisoners. Act requiring granting of free railroad passes to certain officials. Act appropriating \$100,000 for armories. Act increasing the University of Oregon appropriation to \$125,000 per annum.

#### Submitted by Initiative Petition.

Proposed Legislation: Act for protection of salmon on the lower Columbia. Act instructing members of legislature to vote for people's choice for senator. Act limiting expenditures for political campaign purposes. Act to protect salmon on the Upper Columbia. Act to create Hood River county. Amendments to Constitution: Equal suffrage. Giving cities exclusive control of liquor selling, gambling, etc. Exempting dwelling houses, factories, tools, furniture, etc., from taxation. Giving voters the power to recall public officers. Providing for proportional representation. Limiting the power of district attorneys to file indictments.

Registration opens for primaries, January 6. Closes for primary, April 7. Primary election, April 17. Registration re-opens April 21. Closes for election, May 15. General election, June 1. Registration re-opens, September 29. Closes for election, October 20. Presidential election, November 3.

## British Columbia Places Its Forest Lands in Reserves.

Washington, Feb. 17.—At one stroke of the Lieutenant Governor's pen, 150,000,000 acres of forest land in British Columbia have been placed in reserves. This includes every acre of the province's timberlands, except what has been leased. This is as much land as was put in the National Forests of this country between the years 1891 and 1907.

The action was taken to check wasteful exploitation of timber resources and to bring the care and cutting of timber more effectively under government control.

The province has been leasing timberland instead of selling it. The most of the leasing has been done the past three or four years, and Americans hold the largest part of the 10,000 leases now in force. The lease is, in its effect, a long-term option at low rate. It runs 21 years and may be renewed at the end of the first term. The lessee pays 25 cents a year until he is ready to cut the timber, when he pays a royalty of 50 cents per 1000 feet, board measure, for the timber removed. The income of the province from leases was about \$1,275,000 last year.
