COUNCIL APPOINTS CRAMER MARSHAL

Salary Fixed at \$75 Per Month—General Clean-Up of City Is Ordered.

At a called meeting of the city council Monday night, H. C. Cramer was appointed marshal at a salary of \$75 a month. He is also to have charge of the streets and alleys, see that they are cleaned and kept clean, build new sidewalks and crossings and repair the old ones. He is to make a daily report of affairs in his department.

Mr. Cramer has a fine record as an executive officer and the citizens of the town are pleased that he has undertaken the duties of marshal. It is a sure thing the law will be enforced and good judgment used in the enforcement.

The answer of the E. M. & M. Co to the council's proposition on buying the waterworks, was read and ordered placed on file.

The bill of the county for taxes paid to city, \$1.65 on the Matheny property that by mistake was thought to be within the city limits, was allowed.

DEATH RECORD.

Walter Daugherty, well known resident of Chico, died Thursday night, March 19, at 8 o'clock, aged 71 years. He had been in failing health for some time. He leaves a widow, five children, four brothers and seven grandchildren to mourn his death. The children are G. H. Daugherty, J. J. Daugherty, Mrs. Minnie Newby, C. B. Daugherty and Miss Daisy Daugherty; the brothers are W. B. Daugherty, of Joseph; James and C. B. Daugherty, of Chico and Reese Daugherty, of Clackamas. Funeral was held Saturday, interment being in Prairie Creek cemetery.

Mr. Daugherty had been a resident of Oregon for 56 years, and took part in the Indian wars during the fifties. He settled on a homestead near Chico in 1861.

Barney Mullady, a well known character of this and Union counties, was found dead on the O. R. & N. right of way, two miles below the bridge, Friday. The body was found by John Fisher. The old man had been missing for over a week, he having come out from the McCully & Rumble timber for

supplies and it is supposed he died of heart disease while on his way from the bridge.

Mullady was an old man with no known relatives. He had long been in the employ of F. D. McCully, and since an injury a few years ago was given such light employment as he could do.

Baker City Wins From The Dalles

Baker City high school won the debate from The Dalles high school at Baker City Friday night on the question, "Resolved, That the Government Should Own and Operate the Railroads of the United States."

The Dalles had the affirmative and was represented by Miss Jeune Mullikin, Ray Harper and Harry Nitschke. Baker City upheld the negative, and the arguments were made by William Hermesen, Frank McColloch and Roy Barton.

Bert Huffman, editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian; Judge Thomas Crawford and Attorney Charles Cochran, of La Grande, were the judges. An audience of 500 interested people listened attentively to the arguments.

Baker City has won the championship of the Eastern Oregon district, and some time in the near future will meet the debating team from the Astoria high school in an inter-district contest.

Every debate in the Eastern Oregon division was won by teams of the town in which the debate was held.

Harrington's Body Found.

The body of Arthur Harrington, who was drowned last May while trying to cross the Grande Ronde river on horseback above Troy, was found by Leonard Baird and James Winters about three miles below Shumaker's on the Baird place. The body had lodged beneath the root of a willow, perhaps a foot from the edge of the water, and was under the water until the water fell from cold weather.

MANY ARE STUNG BY FIGHTING BUG

Prominent Men Engage In Personal Encounters—Reverend Batchelder Egged at Flora.

The fighting bug that started in Enterprise two weeks ago has been stinging up and down the valley and even in the North country, involving preachers, law officers, candidates and prominent citizens.

At Wallowa Friday afternoon, Rev. E. J. Moore, who has been active in enforcing the Sunday closing law, battered up W. L. Witherell, keeper of a soft drink shop and pool room, in front of the latter's place of business. It is claimed by Moore's friends that Witherell at used Moore as he was passing and then struck him. Moore got the better of the encounter. E. C. Berry interfered and struck Moore. All the parties were arrested. Marshal McNeill laid a charge of disturbing the peace against both principals and each pleaded guilty and paid a fine of 85 each. Witherell and Berry came to Enterprise and swore out a warrant before Justice Smith against Moore on charge of assault with brass knuckles, a pair of which the preacher used in the fight. This charge was withdrawn Monday, as it was agreed by all hands to let the affair quiet down. Rev. Moore also withdrew charges of assault he made before Recorder Tulley against Witherell and Berry.

E. C. Berry states that Moore was the verbal aggressor in the affair, and that he (Berry) interfered when he saw Moore using the knuckles. Berry also claims the blow he gave Moore stopped the fight.

Fight at Joseph.

J. M. Mitchell and J. P. Rusk had a personal encounter on the streets of Joseph Sunday afternoon. It is claimed Rusk was struck several times by Mitchell, and knocked down once, and then "Jerry" took off his glasses and waded in, giving Mitchell a severe beating. Mitchell, who is an elderly man, was one of four who were arrested on a charge of playing poker last week, on warrants sworn out by Rusk, who is deputy district attorney.

Both men were arrested, Mitchell pleading guilty to assault and paying his fine. Rusk was to have been tried before Recorder Eberhard Tuesday, but on motion of J. A. Burleigh, attorney for Rusk, the trial was postponed by the court until April 20.

Throw Eggs at Preacher.

Rev. F. W. Batchelder, who was conducting a revival meeting at Flora, was egged after his sermon on Dancing, a week ago last Sunday night. It is claimed his language was unfit for the pulpit and certain citizens took that method of expressing their disapproval.

W. C. Moore, who was in the church, said in Enterprise this week, that the sermon was a string of indecent stories unfit to be repeated in a company of men, let alone a church crowded with women and girls. The expressions that Moore charges Batchelder used are unfit to print. It is said that about five dozen eggs were thrown at the preacher, but were badly aimed as Mr. Batchelder is reported as claiming only four eggs struck him. Mr. Moore says it is unknown who threw the eggs.

The two weeks protracted meeting conducted by Rev. Batchelder in the M. E. church was a success. There were a number of conversions. Six persons joined the church on probation and one was taken into full membership Sunday. The meetings closed Tuesday evening.

Walter McClure, wife and two children, and a Mr. Hamby of Cedar county, Mo., arrived the first of the week and will locate on a Prairie Creek place. Mr. Hamby's brother, who has been here for a year past, went out to Elgin to meet them. The newcomers are from Assessor S. F. Pace's old home county.

Runaway on Trout Creek Hill.

One of the lead horses on the stage klicked over the traces coming down Trout creek hill Tuesday afternoon and a runaway followed. The driver, Ellery Rose, held to the reins and at the bottom turn the horses piled up on one another though the stage did not overturn. Miss Lou Bridwell of Lostine was in the driver's seat and pluckily climbed back into the body of the stage thence to the hind boot. The other passengers, a half dozen men, were walking down the short cut. One of the wheelers broke a leg. The horse that started the runaways was 116

Signs of O. R. & N. Resuming Work

J. E. Patterson of this city, who had just started on his sub-contract from Erickson & Peterson for clearing and leveling the depot grounds here last fall when the suspension order came, has received a letter from Chief Engineer Boshke of the O. R. & N., in regard to resuming the same work under the direction of the railroad construction department. The letter asked for terms of workmen, teams, superintendence, etc.

A special from La Grande to the News Record states that the O. R. & N. concrete mixer has been brought there from the Riparia-Lewiston bridge over the Clearwater, and the presumption is that it is in readiness to begin work on the abutments of the permanent bridge over the Grande Ronde at the mouth of the Wallowa.

The bridge over Cabin creek below Elgin, washed out last week, has been replaced and a train of logs for the Palmer lumber mill went through Elgin Thursday.

There is general belief in railroad circles both at La Grande and Elgin that work on the Joseph extension will be resumed in a few weeks.

Republican State Convention Date

Portland, March 21—G. A. Westgate, chairman of the Republican state committee, has received instructions from the national committee making it impossible to delay the holding of the state convention until after the primary on April 17, and he will therefore issue the call for the convention to be held on April 15.

The purpose of the state convention is to select four presidential electors and four delegates, with alternates, to the Republican National convention, to be held in Chicago June 16. The First congressional district is also expected to meet at the same time as the state convention and select two delegates and a similar number of alternates. The committee of the Second congressional district was never organized, and unless organization is soon effected it will be the duty of the state convention to select two delegates and alternates for that district.

Dedicate Troy Bridge April 8.

The county court has set Wednesday, April 8, for the formal dedication of the big bridge over the Wenaha river at Troy. Delegations will go from the valley as well as the surrounding country.
