And only those regi-tered voters who gav their party as either Republican or Democratic can vote. Socialists, Independents, Prohibitionists, men of no party need no bother about going to the polls on April 17. Following is the law: "No elector shall be qualified to vote, nor permitted to vote, at my such primary nominating electio required by this law, and it shall be unlawful for him to offer to do 10, uniess he shall be registered, as above required, as a member of one of the political parties choosing and nominating its candidate- for public office under the provisions of this law at such primar, nominating election."
