## ELECTRIC ROAD IS HEADED THIS WAY

**Walla Walla Company Has Made Surveys To Mouth of Little Salmon River.**

Cheering news is brought from Walla Walla about the proposed electric railway from that city into Wallowa county, by Geo. S. Craig who has just returned from there where he attended the graduating recital of his daughter, Miss Joyce, at Whitman College Conservatory of Music. Mr. Craig is convinced the Walla Walla people mean business. In an interview with the News Record he said: "I was much surprised at the things being done by Walla Walla capitalists in the matter of the electric line we have been frequently hearing about. It can be said with certainty that they have thoroughly investigated and surveyed a route from Walla Walla to the Grand Ronde river at or near the mouth of the Little Salmon. People of Walla Walla are very anxious for the road to be continued on to Enterprise and I found that they stand ready to assist in a substantial manner in the continuation of the line from the Grand Ronde river to this city. They already know about the population of the north end of the county, and the fertility of the soil in all parts of the county, and have evidently figured out that besides tapping a big timber belt they can no doubt do a good business in freight and passenger traffic between the north end of the county and Enterprise. If the people of Enterprise will show one-half as much enthusiasm in the matter as is shown in Walla Walla we can expect something to be doing. Much of my information I received on my trip is confidential and I am not at liberty to make it public at this time. I will say this much however, that now is the time for us to get busy."

## HORSE SHOW WAS SPLENDID EXHIBIT

**Big Crowd Sees Parade in Public Square—Johnson's Morgan Takes Popular Fancy.**

In the exhibit and crowd the Enterprise horse show equalled, and in the judgment of many, surpassed that of a year ago, which is saying a good deal, as all who saw the exhibition of last April will acknowledge.

The weather was perfect, Saturday, and the horses showed to grand advantage. The town was filled with visitors, who enjoyed the music by the Enterprise Concert band and the splendid equine show in the public square.

The center of attraction was of course Jack Johnson's beautiful Morgan, Charion, the first full-blooded horse of that kind ever brought to this county. And he is a beauty, both in color and form—"as pretty as a picture," everyone said. His gentleness and intelligence are said to match his beauty. Charion's registered number is 4715, and he was raised in a celebrated Morgan stud in Montana where Mr. Johnson bought him a few months ago for \$1090.

## Notes From The Political Field

Dr. G. W. Gregg was elected mayor of Wallowa last week, receiving 57 votes to 33 for J. P. Morelock who was seeking re-election. S. T. Combs, Wm. Sherod, and Chas. Hunter were elected councilmen, E. A. Searle recorder, and Bruce Cox treasurer.

H. N. Williams has a notice in the Wallowa Sun saying he is in favor of making a one mill levy in 1910 and 1911 to build a court house not to cost over \$20,000.

### Union County Registration.

The total registration of Union county is 3144, and includes 1820 Republicans, 1073 Democrats, 127 Socialists, 49 Prohibitionists, 68 Independents, 7 refused to answer, and one fellow said he was a "Christian."

### Republican State Convention.

The Republican state convention will be held at Portland, May 14, and the two congressional district conventions will be held at the same time and place. The state convention will select four presidential electors and four delegates to the national convention. The districts will each name two delegates to the National convention. Of the 239 delegates to the state convention, Wallowa county is entitled to send four, to be chosen in such manner as the county central committee may direct.

### Get In The Berry Bandwagon.

E. C. Berry has been meeting with great favor in his canvass for the Democratic nomination for sheriff ever since the campaign opened, but the last week he reports has been the best yet, and he is confident of victory, Friday. The upper valley is going his way and he is promised a heavy vote in both Joseph and Enterprise. He has been getting over the country and there's mighty few voters he hasn't seen personally, and old campaigners will tell you it's personal work that counts. In his capacity as deputy he has been assisting Sheriff Bakely taking ballot boxes to outlying precincts the past week.

### County Division Impossible.

Under the provisions of Section 2, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution the legislature is deprived of the power to divide counties or to create new ones. Consequently, reports that any candidate for the legislature favors such a move are not circulated because there is any real or apparent danger, but for political purposes alone.
