ENTERPRISE WILL AID NORTH ROAD

Mass Meeting Sentiment Unanimous And Enthusiastic for Railroad to North Country.

The citizens of Enterprise went on record at the big mass meeting Tuesday night on the proposition of a railroad to the North Country. Not that there has been any doubt of the sentiment on that subject but it has now been expressed in concrete form, and the time for action is near at hand.

After the nominations for city officers were made, the following resolutions were offered and read by the secretary, J. A. Burleigh:

Resolutions.

Whereas, There are numerous reports of railroads projected from Wallowa and Lewiston into Wallowa county, at least one of which is considered more than "hot air," as evidenced by costly surveys, and

Whereas, the completion of the Elgin-Joseph extension would still leave the north end of this county, commonly known as the North Country, far from a railroad, and

Whereas, a spur from Enterprise to the North Country would be beneficial alike to that great section and to this city; therefore be it

Resolved, that it is the sentiment of the citizens of Enterprise assembled in this mass meeting, that we will give every encouragement and assistance to any bona fide project to unite this city with the North Country, and that liberal financial aid will be given the first railroad connecting Enterprise with the north end of the county.

At the conclusion of the reading, the resolutions were heartily applauded and on motion of Dr. C. A. Ault they were unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Short speeches were made enthusiastically endorsing the proposition for a road from Enterprise to the north end of the county.

Expecting Orders.

Portland, April 17—J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the O. R. & N. Co., returned this morning from an extended tour of the lines in Idaho and Oregon. He inspected the work now under way completing the Riparian-Lewiston line into Lewiston, where 800 men are at work putting the road in

condition to carry the Portland-Lewiston excursion May 3. Mr. O'Brien said a reported order to resume construction work at this time on the Elgin-Joseph branch was a mistake. No orders have yet been issued, but it is not unlikely that such orders will be given within a short time. A similar situation prevails with regard to the road from Hillsboro to Tillamook.

Bridge Washed Out.

Elgin, April 20—The temporary bridge over the Looking Glass below here was washed out by high water Sunday night. McCully and Rumble lost 2500 railroad ties by the flood.

DEATH RECORD.

Ruth Russell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. H. Russell, died April 16, after an illness of several weeks. Her age was nearly 17 years. She was in the eighth grade in school at Alder. She was beloved by all her schoolmates and had many friends in the community. She leaves a father and mother, a brother and three sisters to mourn her departure. The funeral was held from Alder church conducted by Rev. F. G. Potter; interment was in the Joseph cemetery where a brother, who died six years ago, is buried.

FULTON DEFEATED; ELLIS WINS AGAIN

Primary Was Triumph for People's Rule—Results in State, District And County.

The result of Friday's primary over the state was a sweeping victory for H. M. Calk for U. S. senator, and for Statement No. 1 candidates for the legislature. Calk's majority over Fulton is close to 3000. He carried Multnomah by over 2000, Union county nearly two to one, and a majority of the counties of the state. Statement No. 1 men will be in a majority in both house and senate if the June election goes as did the primary.

Congressman Ellis is nominated by about 2200 over Shepherd and Geer, who ran nearly even. Altchison is nominated for railroad commissioner by about 700 plurality over Haribart, second on the list. J. W. Bailey, for dairy and food commissioner, has about 15,000 majority. Jeffrey is the Democratic nominee for congress, Governor Chamberlain is the Democratic choice for senator.

District Results.

D. W. Sheahan lost the nomination for circuit judge by the narrow margin of 65. He carried Wallowa by 97, which was overcome by Crawford's 102 in Union. Mr. Sheahan made a splendid run in both counties, and has the satisfaction of carrying his home county by a larger majority in proportion to the vote cast, than his opponent did his home county.

J. W. Knowles is the Republican nominee by a majority of 254 over Davis who was beaten 245 in Union and 9 in Wallowa.

E. W. Rimple, Republican, and Turner Oliver, Democrat, had no opposition as candidates for state senator.

W. W. White is nominated for representative by the Democrats. J. P. Rusk carried Union by 73 over C. R. Eberhard, and Wallowa by 39, giving him 112 majority.

S. F. Richardson is the Republican nominee for representative in Union, E. W. Davis for sheriff, Ed. Wright county clerk, I. R. Snook recorder, R. A. Hug assessor. Frank P. Childers, Democrat for sheriff received 359 to T. B. Johnson 219.

County Results.

The complete official results of the primary in this county are given in table form, the Democratic on page 5 and the Republican on page 8.

E. A. Searle received 31 votes on Republican ballots for county clerk and Claude Boatman 17. It is not known whether Searle will accept or not. Dr. W. C. Ketchum the Enterprise dentist is both the Democratic and Republican nominee for coroner.

A. C. Smith is nominated for justice in Enterprise district by both Republicans and Democrats. Chas. Crumacker is the Democratic nominee for constable, and A. B. Dunbar the Republican.

R. I. Long is nominee for surveyor on both tickets.

New Republican Committee.

The following were elected members of the Republican county committee at Friday's primary: Joseph, F. D. McCully; Enterprise, Geo. W. Hyatt; Wallowa, C. W. Mumford; Powatka, G. L. Post; Promise, J. A. Doud; Lost Prairie, L. Bacon; Flora, J. F. Van Camp; Paradise, O. E. Bodmer; Leap, J. A. Downing; Butte, L. C. Hartshorn; Pittsburg, J. W. Kneeland; Innaha, J. A. Denny; Prairie Creek, L. Knapper.

By instructions of state committee, the new county committee met at the court house at 2 o'clock Wednesday. Members Mumford, McCully and Hyatt were present, C. R. Eberhard held L. Knapper's proxy and Mr. McCully the proxy of C. L. Hartshorn. Mr. McCully was elected chairman and Mr. Hyatt secretary for two years.

The following delegates to the conventions at Portland May 14, were selected:

State—Joseph, F. D. McCully; Enterprise, F. A. Clark; Wallowa, John McDonald; Lostine, J. O. Kiddle. District—Enterprise, W. R. Holmes; Wallowa, C. C. McDaniel; Joseph, L. Knapper; Lostine, S. L. McKenzie.

As no one was present from other precincts no names were put on except from the valley towns, but if any Republican from other precincts cares to go to the conventions he can undoubtedly secure a proxy by writing to either Mr. McCully or Mr. Hyatt.

MAYFIELD NAMED AT MASS MEETING

Popular Young Druggist Nominated for Mayor Without Opposition—One Ticket In Field.

The foregoing is the ticket nominated by the mass meeting held in the court room Tuesday night. The meeting was postponed until the following evening as the election canvassing board was using the room.

The room was packed to its capacity and a more harmonious gathering never filled the benches. Mayor Boyd called the meeting to order and stated its object. W. W. White was unanimously elected chairman and J. A. Burleigh secretary.

Daniel Boyd nominated Byram Mayfield for mayor. A. C. Miller in a short but to the point speech counseled harmony and that he struck the keynote was evidenced by the hearty applause that greeted his remarks. W. R. Holmes moved that the nominations be closed, and this motion and one that the secretary cast the unanimous ballot for Mr. Mayfield, were carried with cheerful unanimity.

To succeed T. R. Akins and W. H. Graves as councilmen four names were put in nomination, and voted on by ballot, resulting as follows: W. H. Graves 48, A. M. Wagner 16, J. W. Bickford 45, V. I. Cronin 15.

Messrs. Graves and Bickford were declared the nominees.

The present incumbents of the other three offices, W. E. Taggart recorder, C. M. Lockwood treasurer, and Thos. M. Dill attorney, were nominated unanimously. Then, after adopting the railroad resolutions, and a brief love feast of short speeches by candidates and other citizens, the meeting adjourned without delay.

Baker City-Astoria Debate.

The semi-final inter-scholastic debate to decide the question of the championship of the state will be held in Astoria Friday evening, April 24, and will be between teams of Baker City and Astoria high schools. The question to be discussed will be: "Resolved, that the Members of the House of Representatives of the State of Oregon Should Be Elected by a System of Proportional Representation." The Astoria team will support the affirmative.
