Enterprise Girl Is Fine Musician
Miss Joyce Craig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Craig of this city, scored a fine triumph in her graduation recital at Whitman college, and is accorded high praise by the Walla Walla papers. Miss Craig was born in Enterprise and her many friends here who have heard her beautiful voice, know there is no overstatement in the following comments:
Walla Walla Evening Statesman:
"Miss Joyce Craig's graduation recital in Whitman college chapel last night proved one of the most popular musical events of the season. The large auditorium was filled to the doors with her many friends and none were disappointed.
"Miss Craig has been a pupil in the conservatory for four years and is an accomplished musician. She has a beautiful soprano voice which is known for its clearness and delicacy of tone. At the piano she is an artist and ably graduates as one of the most accomplished pianists and vocalists the Whitman conservatory has ever turned out. She is a pupil of Prof. Jackson in voice and of Prof. Schofield in piano.
"She was assisted last night by Prof. Schofield at the organ, Miss DeSpain at the piano and by Miss Crowell, violinist."
Walla Walla Daily Union:
"From the opening aria, 'Jerusalem, Thou That Killest the Prophets,' from Mendelssohn, which was rendered with rare charm, to the closing concerto in G minor, Op. 23, also by Mendelssohn, with the Cadenza by Mr. Schofield, Miss Craig held the attention of her audience.
"The program was varied and pleasing. Miss Craig's voice, carefully trained and well modulated, lent a peculiar grace and beauty to all of her vocal numbers. This was particularly noticeable in Schumann's 'Die Lotusblume,' Beethoven's Sonata, and a delightful song cycle, including numbers from Spring, Summer, Autumn, and Winter, as well as in others.
"In the various piano numbers, Miss Craig's musical talent was displayed to equal advantage. Her sympathetic touch, and skillful and accurate rendition of some of the most difficult compositions of the great masters brought forth prolonged applause from the audience.
"Miss Craig has been studying faithfully in the Conservatory for the past four years, during which she has successfully completed the severe course in both piano and vocal departments, an accomplishment wholly unusual. If last night's recital is any criterion, a brilliant future is certainly in store for the young artist."

Snake River Live Stock Men Unite
The cattle and horse raisers of district 15, Innaha National forest, have formed the Pittsburg Livestock association, for mutual benefit, and at the organization meeting held Thursday, April 16, elected the following officers: President, Ben Johnson; vice president, F. P. Somers; secretary, E. A. Mace; treasurer, W. S. Brockman; manager, Mike Thomason. The officers constitute the board of directors. They will serve until the regular meeting on November 23.

labor in the drives and round-ups. To the Students of the Wallowa County High School: Since your kind letter of congratulation upon the occasion of our victory in debate here over your team I have often thought I should write and in the name of our school thank you but lack of time has prevented. As I must write Mr. Moore on a matter of business this morning I take this opportunity of performing a deferred duty. We are very grateful for your courteous act. It is quite unusual, particularly when we won by so low a margin and shows a commendable spirit. I thoroughly detest anything or any act that partakes of the nature of what is in slang called the "baby act" and I try to teach my pupils when they are defeated to meet it with a smile on their faces and without unfavorable comment and work the harder for the next contest. That spirit you certainly have. Now a word in regard to the debate. You have the strongest debating team it has been our fortune to meet this year. I was not present at Baker City when we met them but I judge from what has been told me that you have the stronger team and that your arguments were presented in a better manner. Your young people here did remarkably well. Your rebuttal was the only thing which caused you to lose the debate. Your leader presented his argument, which was strong, in a manner which would do credit to a college debater, but did not do well in rebuttal. He needs practice. With sufficient practice to enable him to think clearly on his feet he should become as strong and I believe the strongest high school debater in the state. I hope when he completes his high school course in your school he will enter the state university and work for a place on the debating team. If he does we shall certainly hear from him. The two girls presented excellent argument and reflected credit upon their school. Their manner of delivery pleased the people and caused much favorable comment. I myself prefer the manner of delivery used by the leader to the elocutionary pose and manner and gestures used by the other speakers but I may be wrong in that. In short you have reason to be proud of your team and I congratulate you most heartily on the superior showing which they made here.
