**DEATH RECORD.**  
Daniel M. Hammaek was born in Knox county, Ky., in June, 1841. He moved with his parents to Missouri in the spring of 1842, from there to Iowa in 1846. He resided there 19 years and then moved with his parents to Union county, Ore., in 1865, and resided there until 1907, when he came to Wallowa county and lived until his death April 23, 1908. He was 67 years and 10 months old. He leaves one brother, J. W. Hammaek of Lostine and two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Lee of Summerville and Mrs. Amanda Grider of La Grande. Daniel M. Hammaek was never married. He was beloved by his many friends and relatives. The funeral was in Lostine conducted by Rev. F. G. Potter, April 25; interment in the Lostine cemetery.  
Mary Frances Wymore, sister of J. W. Wymore of Prairie Creek, died near Lostine, Sunday morning, of tuberculosis, while being brought in from Elgin. Her age was 23 and a half years. She was born in Page county, Iowa, and resided there until this journey to join her brothers in this county. The remains were embalmed by Fred S. Ashley, the Enterprise undertaker, and accompanied by Mr. Wymore left here Monday on the way back to the old home in Heppburn for interment.  
The week-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Coffman of Swamp Creek died Saturday night, and was interred in the Enterprise cemetery Monday morning at 9 o'clock, services being conducted by Rev. N. J. Hammaek, assisted by Rev. Owens. The parents have the sincere sympathy of many friends in their sorrow.
