ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to provide for holding special elections in the city of Enterprise, Wallowa county, Oregon.

The city of Enterprise does ordain as follows:

Section 1. A special election shall be called by the city recorder of the city of Enterprise, in Wallowa county, Oregon, for the purpose of voting on any ordinance, amendment or municipal measure, pertaining to the city charter, of the city of Enterprise, Oregon.

Section 2. The recorder under the direction of the city council shall give notice of such special election by causing notice thereof to be published in a newspaper, published in the city of Enterprise, for at least two weekly publications, and which notice shall contain the date when and place where such special election shall be held; the amendment, ordinance or municipal measure to be voted on; and the hour when the polls shall be opened and closed, and the date of the first publication of such notice.

Section 3. Within thirty days and not less than fifteen days from the date when the recorder shall have been directed to call such special election, the city council shall appoint three judges of election, two of whom shall act as clerks of election.

Section 4. The polls shall be open from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 7 o'clock in the afternoon, and all persons who are qualified electors, under the laws of the State of Oregon, and have resided thirty days in the city of Enterprise, Oregon, immediately preceding the election, shall be entitled to vote at such special election.

Section 5. In case any judge or clerk of such special election appointed by the council shall be absent at the time of the opening of the polls, the electors present may appoint some person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies, but all judges and clerks must be duly qualified electors of the city; but an error in the notice of election or the qualifications of judges and clerks of such special election shall not invalidate the election.

Section 6. Immediately after the close of the polls the ballots shall be counted and the returns made out and certified to by the judges and clerks of election. The ballots shall be placed in packages, and the packages securely sealed, and within twenty-four hours thereafter the returns shall be filed and the ballots deposited with the city recorder.

Section 7. Within five days after such special election, the city council shall meet and canvass the returns, and the recorder shall upon order of the council publish the results of such election, one time, in a newspaper, published in said city of Enterprise, Oregon.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the Mayor, and publication according to law.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS.

The vote was duly canvassed and abstracted according to law, and there appeared against swine running at large, No. 1223 votes; for swine running at large, Yes, 21 votes. It is therefore hereby declared by the Court that the result of said election for the entire county was against swine running at large.

It is therefore hereby considered and ordered by the court that the running at large of swine is hereby absolutely forbidden and prohibited within the limits of said Wallowa county, Oregon, from and after sixty days from the date of the first publication of this notice, under penalty of five dollars for first offense, ten dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the swine by civil action in the name of the state of Oregon. Sec. 4240, V. L. 2, B. & C. Codes and Statutes of Oregon.
