COUNTY COMMISSIONERS ACCEPT TROY BRIDGE

Commissioners Litch and Locke inspected the Troy bridge July 22, and after a careful examination accepted the structure from the contractors T. F. and Duane Lathrop. The bridge was erected last winter but the north abutment was left five feet lower than the solid rock on which the south end of the bridge rested. The court ordered the north end raised to a level with the top of the south abutment, and this the Lathrops have been doing the last month.

They have done a good job, too, the long span, 110 feet, the longest in the county, being on a level and a fairly good earth and rock approach put in on the north. The north abutment is protected from high water by rock rip-rapping, and the bridge is painted from end to end with coal tar.
