The latter swore he would get even, and had Selbert covered with his Winchester as the four horse team that Selbert was driving drove in sight on the river road about 20 miles from Republic. The bullet struck Selbert in the abdomen and he lived only 30 minutes. A big posse has been hunting for the murderer but up to the time J. B. Selbert left the desperado was still at large. The funeral of the murdered man was held Tuesday and was very largely attended, the deceased being well thought of up there.
