DUG TO GRANITE BEDROCK BUT FOUND NO GOLD

Up in the mountains near the head of the South Fork, a miner convinced that a deposit of sand and gravel contained free gold, dug a shaft to bed rock, 60 feet, but found none of the precious stuff. J. B. Seibert of Enterprise and Elmer Biggs of Lostine, who returned Monday from a prospecting trip, found the old Sammy Samuels' shaft, as it is called, and found his last panning with the bits of granite bedrock mixed with the sand and gravel.

Seibert and Biggs made quite a tramp up the South Fork and around the headwaters of that stream and also of the Minam, in the country west of Eagle Cap. They found no placers but say they found good indications of copper lodes.

Praises City For Civic Enterprise

Portland Journal Lauds La Grande For Voting Water Works Bonds.

Under the caption "A Progressive Oregon City," the Portland Journal had the following laudatory editorial about La Grande, which Enterprise can fairly take as applying to this city also, as we will spend nearly as much proportionately for water works as will the Union county seat: Among the cities of Oregon that are attracting admiring attention because of doing things, La Grande is taking a high rank, and this largely because of the great enterprise being carried on there to secure an ample supply of the best kind of water. This is one of the prime essentials of any town, after it has grown into one of a few thousand inhabitants, and has ambition and opportunities to grow and amount to something municipally.

La Grande will spend \$100,000 for a water and sewer system. The bonds were voted over a year ago, and have recently been sold in Chicago. The water will be secured from a pure adequate mountain stream, at a point 17 miles from the city, and will be brought in an immense flume to a reservoir and will be sufficient for many years to come. Surplus flow will be used to operate a modern, complete sewer system. There will be water enough for fire-fighting purposes, so that the city will get revenue not only from water consumers, but from power consumers. It will run its own lighting plant also. This is the way to do things. Thus a city grows and becomes worthy to grow—so long as such enterprises are conducted on the square, are free from graft, and partisan politics is eliminated from them. The city can henceforth be healthful, clean in all ways progressive.

Corvallis has done the same, if not on quite so extensive a scale. Eugene and Medford are preparing to do so, though in their and some other cases, the problem is greater because a surely ample supply of surely right water is not so available. But these and other Oregon cities will succeed, will solve these problems. La Grande is setting an example. Now watch it grow and prosper.
