

And between the two. guesswork regulation by prejudiced commissions and government ownership, Mr. Cotton said the railroad men themselves would take the lead in favor of the latter. Mr. Harriman said, in substance, the same thing in a speech at Kansas City, a couple of years ago, If people don't want-are not ready for-government ownership, in the name of fairness they should strive for a better understanding of the rate regulation problem. 
