Modern research lends color to the
belief that the ancient Egyptians

immediately lose caste. Evidently

plague than lose caste.

After every election the winning

ing side is correspondingly disap-
pointed. But the feelings of both ar-
soon modified by the thought of the
next election, and the knowledge that
the whirligig of time may make the
defeated of today the victor of to-
morrow. And, apart from this, once
the fever of excitement has disap-
peared and people calmly consider
the verdict, there is the general rec-
ognition that all parties are earnest
for the nation's good, however much
they may differ from one another in
political principles and methods.

a date as practicable so that the
same can be gotten in proper
form before the legislature meets.

The number of states that voted

dent of party control. The increas-
ing size of this vote adds to the un-
certainty and anxiety with which
party managers carry on a campaign.
