Why Build Snake River Railroad

IMPORTANCE OF HUNTINGTON-LEWISTON LINE TOLD IN OFFICIAL PUBLICATION.

In an official publication by the Union Pacific relative to the plans of the company dealing with new lines, says the Lewiston Tribune, considerable attention is devoted to the Huntington-Lewiston line now under construction and its objects. From this publication the following data is secured, showing the general plan of the Harriman system to reduce its grades by adopting water grade routes, etc.:

"From Salt Lake City the Oregon Short Line runs north to Pocatello, Idaho. Here it connects with a cut-off from Green River, Wyoming. That part of this road between Granger and Pocatello has been developed to the highest possible standard of railroad perfection. Its maximum grade is one per cent. At Memmerer, which is a great coal-producing section, it is possible to take a train of 3,000 tons and haul it to Pocatello, 200 miles away, with but one locomotive. From Ogden to Pocatello the line has a maximum grade of 37 feet to the mile. From Pocatello the line crosses the state of Idaho to Huntington, Oregon, with a maximum grade of one per cent. Every foot of this line has been thoroughly ballasted. Eighty-pound rails have been installed from Salt Lake City to Pocatello and continued on the branch line to Butte, Montana. Ninety-pound rails have been installed from Granger to Pocatello, whereas, when Mr. Harriman took hold of this line, the rails weighed from 52 to 60 pounds. From Pocatello to Huntington the rails now used weigh from 70 to 80 pounds. These are now being renewed frequently and the company is now pursuing the policy of using tie plates on every new tie installed. Automatic signals have been installed from Granger to Pocatello. Similar signals are also in place from Huntington to Nampa. Double tracking is in progress between Green river and Granger, some 30 miles.

"At the present time the Oregon Short Line is constructing a new branch from Huntington, Oregon, down the valley of the Snake river, designed eventually to extend to Lewiston, connecting there with the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company and probably become a through trans-continental line. This would give the company a water grade all the way from Salt Lake City to Portland. Fifty-nine miles of this line have been authorized, and twenty-five miles have been graded. This construction is made necessary by the fact that the present grade from Huntington, going west across the Blue mountains, is sometimes as much as 106 feet to the mile, thus rendering conditions of transportation extremely expensive.

"The O. R. & N. is now making an extension of its branch from Elgin, Oregon, to Joseph, a distance of 63 miles. After completion this line will tap an exceptionally rich agricultural section. To the north is the great Palouse country of Washington, wonderfully productive in wheat. "The line of the O. R. & N. between Huntington and Portland presents some of the most difficult operating problems on the Harriman system. From The Dalles to Portland, a distance of 88 miles, the old line was full of curves. The company has, however, been removing both curvature and heavy grades, as well as improving the track. A total of about \$1,500,000 has now been spent in this direction. About 227 miles of the finest ballast has been placed on this route from Huntington to Portland. From The Dalles to Portland the longest stretch of straight track at the present time, amounts to two miles. In one improvement, however, now under way between Troutdale and Bonneville, a distance of 17.48 miles, the reduction in curvature will amount to 1454 degrees, 51 minutes. The amount of bridging is also being largely reduced. Five years ago there were seven and one-half miles of bridges between Portland and The Dalles. This has now been reduced to about half a mile. All the bridges which remain are of the finest steel construction. The entire line from Huntington to Portland has been equipped with automatic block signals."

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Weiser a Division.
Relative to the construction of the Lewiston-Huntington line, the Weiser Signal says:

"It is reported on good authority that early in the spring the Oregon Short Line will make Weiser a division point, removing the repair shops and round house from Huntington, Oregon, to this city. This action is made necessary on the part of the railroad company on account of the opening of the new Snake river division, running from Huntington, on the Oregon side of the Snake, which will be completed and in operation within a short time as far as Homestead, Oregon, where is located the celebrated Iron Dyke mine. This will give the big copper and gold mines on both sides of the river a tremendous advantage in shipping their ores to the smelters. The road will be at once pushed on through the Box canyon to Lewiston, Ida., which will, of course, be the next division point on the O. R. & N.

"The opening of this line through Lewiston means much to the people of southern Idaho. In the first place it will shorten the distance from Boise to all points in northern Idaho, and will make the railroad fare less than half what it is at present. Passengers now have to go via Pendleton and Riparia, changing cars twice en route. The managers of the Harriman system of railroads in the northwest state that it is their intention to give the people of Idaho and Oregon the very best possible service at the least possible cost."
