PENITENTIARY REPORT.
Report of Superintendent James of the state penitentiary shows that of the 419 prisoners four are from Wallowa county. The total is divided proportionate to population among the counties of the state with a few exceptions, such as Baker, with 30, Union 28, Umatilla 40 and Wasco 22, have more than their proportion, while three counties, Benton, Lincoln and Yamhill, have no representatives.

There are 34 serving life sentence, and 215 under sentence of less than five years. There are 3 women, and of the total 207 are classed as having no church affiliation, 103 Catholics, 106 Protestants, 2 Greeks and one Jew.

By occupations before commitment there are 96 laborers, 56 farmers, 23 teamsters, 21 cooks, 19 waiters, 19 miners, 17 carpenters, 11 firemen, 10 bookkeepers and 10 engineers, the remainder being divided among other occupations in smaller numbers. The report says there is not a preacher, lawyer, newspaper man or school teacher in the list, but does not say why.
