The bill Representative Rusk got through the legislature, fixing the salary of the school superintendent of Wallowa county at \$1200, was vetoed by Governor Chamberlain after the legislature adjourned. The bill contained a provision that attempted to refer the matter of increase to the people of the county. Regarding this the governor states: "It purports to submit the act to the voters of Wallowa county, but the referendum therein contained is imperfect and the bill will become operative at the expiration of 90 days after the adjournment of the session unless vetoed."

### \$80,000 IMPROVEMENTS SURE IN ENTERPRISE

Over \$80,000 of improvements in Enterprise are already under way this year or contracted for. This only includes the courthouse, wool-growers warehouse, the city water works system and such residences as are now being built or are under contract.
