Peter Ficker (so I have been told) has kindly offered to fix up his large store building for a grand ball at night. There will be the best of dance music and probably a basket picnic on the grounds in the day time, plenty of games, a good program, and last, but not least, some good speaker to keep us from forgetting the meaning of the 4th of July or Independence day and our patriotism ever true.

Road Work.
Several of our ranchers have donated work on the Troy hill road to make it passable, when finished, for wagons. Pearl Stevenson worked 10 or 15 days; Jesse Beecher worked 22 days; Ed Wilcox and Charlie Haroldson each worked quite a number of days, and James Downing has donated 23 days all told. Mr. Downing is past the age limit, but that didn't keep him from doing the work. If the Eden men could all work at the same time, it would not take very long to get a good wagon road to Troy, then we would be "it," and we would keep the weeds down from traveling over it so often.

There will soon be telephone connection to Flora, as the poles are all up, and soon the wire will be strung. Next summer the Edenites expect to have a line down to Troy. If they do they will be wise, for many a long trip will be saved by having one, and maybe many a dollar saved also.
