ANT FLAT RANCH SOLD FOR \$10,800

RD OF CLARKSTON BUYS MORE HILL LAND—OTHER TRANSFERS.

The D. R. Allen land, consisting of 720 acres 4 1/2 miles north of Enterprise was transferred Wednesday to W. E. Howard, the Clarkston capitalist who recently bought the M. Hodge homestead. The deal had been hanging fire several weeks, as Mr. Allen was in West Virginia when negotiations began and has since gone to California. W. E. Taggart, the pioneer real estate man, made the sale which was for \$10,800 or \$15 an acre. The tract is so called hill land, though in this case a large part is as level as a barn floor, and includes the major part of Ant flat. The land was held as low as \$10 an acre a year or so ago, but everybody is satisfied it is cheap at \$15 today.

Another Hill Ranch Sold. The Enterprise Real Estate company has sold the C. W. Hicks tract of 150 acres near Leap to R. F. Stubblefield for \$2500. It is an extra good grazing ranch and has a fine spring on it.

Mr. Hicks has bought of Mr. Stubblefield a ten acre tract in the north part of Enterprise.

Rev. W. P. Samms has bought of Brennen Stubblefield, the W. K. Stubblefield home in the northeast part of town. It consists of a block of land, with small house and barn. Consideration was \$1500.

Five Million Feet Of Logs Pledged

The Eisenbeis Saw Mill Will Be Moved to M. P. Miller Woods.

W. F. Eisenbeis has closed a contract with M. P. Miller and other land owners in 2 north, 44, by which he will move his saw mill to a site near the M. P. Miller school house, under a guarantee of five million feet of logs.

The land owners have organized the Spring Dale Lumber Manufacturing company for the purpose of putting their timber on the market in the form of lumber. Some of the best lumber in the county is in that vicinity. Mr. Eisenbeis says that the landowners in the company can furnish twenty million feet in addition to the five million pledged.

The Eisenbeis mill is at present on the O. J. Roe place on Alder Slope but will be moved as soon as the roads harden. The lumber will be marketed both here and at Wallowa, the location being only three miles farther from Enterprise than Wallowa.

COUNCIL CONTRACTS 3 CEMENT WALKS

PERMANENT CROSSINGS WILL BE TESTED—GENERAL SPRING CLEAN-UP.

The placing of streets, culverts and walks in good repair formed the principal business of a special meeting of the city council held Tuesday night. Shields, Chatham and others were given a contract to put permanent crosswalks for \$160, contractors furnishing all material and labor. Two walks will be put in at the corner of River and Main streets and one across West First street from the Fraternal building corner. Wooden crosswalks have been costing \$37 each. Culverts were ordered in at the lower end of Main street, and the one on Prairie Creek road repaired. New approaches to the bridge on De street will be put in. A bridge was ordered built across the city ditch in the southeast part of town. Bills allowed: Ben Ownbey, \$15, for fixing city ditch; J. B. Seibert, \$25.00, police duty on October 31. Committee reported contract with Charles Thomas to oversee in behalf of the city, the putting in of the gas at \$75 a month.

Incorporate Big Mining Company

Williams, Burleigh and Others Organize To Develop Lick Creek Mining Claims.

The Wallowa County Mining and Development company, capital stock \$2,000,000, is a new corporation just

organized, the incorporators being H. G. W. and J. R. Williams, S. Moore, J. A. Read, Jesse Walker, S. O. Magee and J. A. Burleigh. The purpose is the development and working of 15 mining claims on Lick creek, commonly known as the Williams group.

The claims are very promising. Two hundred foot tunnels have been run and the big ledge of rich quartz extends across both of them.

The incorporators are well known citizens of this county, and have spent a considerable sum already in development work. It is said 100,000 shares of the stock will be placed on the market.

Methodists Will Build Parsonage

At the quarterly conference of the M. E. church held Monday afternoon the board of trustees, led by the pastor, the church were constituted a building committee and authorized to select plans, raise the money necessary and build a new parsonage.

The purpose of the organization is to promote the spirit of christian brotherhood among men and to develop their activity in all that relates to social, civic and religious betterment.

J. A. Burleigh was elected president and J. A. Holmes secretary. Revs. L. L. Howarth, of Joseph, and J. D. Bird, of Wallowa, were present in addition to those previously mentioned. After the meeting a splendid banquet was given the men by the Ladies Aid society, at the home of J. A. Burleigh.
