

nishes the following extract from the new state scalp bounty law, for the information of the public; etion 1. There shall be paid by Call From Church the State of Oregon and the counties thereof as in this act and in the

killing and destruction of the follownamed animals, hereafter killed in the State of Oregon, the following bountles: For each coyote or coyote pur, \$1.50; for each gray wo'f or black wol", \$5.00; for each gray wolf pup, black wolf pup, timper wolf or timber wolf pup, \$2.50; for each bob cat, wild cat or lynx. \$2.00; for each mountain lion, pan-

ther or cougar, \$10.00. Section 2. Any person killing any of the aforesaid animals in order to obtain the bounty provided for in county in which said animal or aniof each of said animal or animals, ttached thereto all four of the paws. of, eye holes, and skin to tip of nose; and shall at the same time make and


