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INFORMATION FOR VARMINT HUNTERS.

(Continued from front page.)

aforsaid, taking his receipt therefor (which receipt shall show (1) the date of issue, (2) the number and kind of scalps so produced, (3) the amount paid, and (4) the date each of said animals was killed, and be signed by the person to whom said bounty is paid), a warrant signed by him and attested by the seal of his office and drawn upon the general fund of the county treasury; which said warrant shall show the date of the presentation of the scalps and affidavit, the name of the person presenting the same, the kind and number of scalps presented and the amount to which the party shall be entitled. Such warrant shall be paid in the same manner as other warrants drawn upon the general fund of the county treasury. Upon the presentation of the skin or skins as aforesaid of each gray wolf, gray wolf pup, black wolf, black wolf pup, timber wolf, or timber wolf pup, bob cat, wild cat, lynx, mountain lion, panther or cougar, and the making and filing of the above mentioned affidavit, the county clerk shall to prevent fraud minutely examine each skin presented and carefully inspect both ears thereon; should such examination and inspection disclose that the entire skin with all its parts as is above set forth, including all four feet or paws, has not been severed, unattached, unched, patched or in any manner marked, he shall there in the presence of the person or persons presenting such skin or skins mark each skin by severing therefrom both front feet or paws, at a point at least five inches above the bottom or lower extremity of each foot or paw. And in addition hereto said county clerk shall punch three holes in the base or roof of each ear, on the scalp of such skin or skin which said front feet or paws have been removed (each hole to be punched shall be at least one-eighth inch in diameter), and then redeliver such skin or skins to the person presenting the same. The county clerk shall retain possession of said two front feet or paws severed and is due to said person or persons presenting the skin or skins and making affidavit as aforesaid, taking his receipt therefor (which receipt shall show (1) the date of issue, (2) the number and kind of skins so produced, (3) the amount paid, and (4) the date each of said animals was killed, and be signed by the person to whom said bounty is paid), a warrant signed by him and attested by the seal of his office, and drawn upon the general fund of the county treasury; which said warrant shall show the date of the presentation of the scalps and affidavit, the name of the person presenting the same, the kind and number of skins presented and the amount to which the party shall be entitled. Such warrant shall be paid in the same manner as other warrants drawn upon the general fund of the county treasury.

Telephone To Troy.

The first message from Troy over the new telephone line arrived just after 10 o'clock this morning, said the Flora Journal of April 23. Among those interviewed was Peter Flicker, who pronounces the fruit crop down that way to be "all right." He further said that Troy was on the boom, that in the last month the population had increased two-thirds. On being loosely questioned regarding a conservative estimate of the population of the burg, he explained that when he sold out to Mr. Vallea the population was doubled and Mr. Barkham's arrival completed the two-thirds increase.

USELESS TO MAKE ENTRY UNDER 320 ACRE ACT.

Recorder Bramwell of the La Grande and office has received a letter from the general land office stating that parties gain no rights whatever by applying for entry under the enlarged homestead act, and he is instructed to immediately reject all such applications. Until the list of lands are designated by the secretary of the interior is made, no entries will be received for any tract larger than 160 acres. It is not known how soon such lists may be made. The 320 acre act applies to only non-trigable non-mineral land that contains no merchantable timber. Such an entry cannot be commuted and at least one-eighth of the land must be under cultivation continually from the second year, and at least one-fourth from the third year. It will be months and likely years before the list of lands subject to 320 acre entry is completed by the secretary of the interior.
