**PERMIT FOR USE  
OF COUNTY ROADS**

(Continued from front page.)

Third Judicial Day.  
Friday, May 7.

In the matter of the Wm. Newby road:  
District attorney having reported favorably, it is considered and ordered that said road be allowed and opened for public travel according to the survey thereof, when the petitioners pay all damages.

In the matter of the T. M. Gilmore road:  
The district attorney having reported unfavorably, on account of the affidavit of posting being defective, it is ordered that the same be and is hereby continued.

In the matter of appointing a county fruit inspector:  
After fully examining all petitions on file, it is ordered that the same be and hereby is continued.

In the matter of the application of the City of Enterprise, Oregon, for right of way to lay mains or water pipes underground, upon and across the county roads in Wallowa County, Oregon:  
Application filed by said city to lay pipes across and at other points lengthwise in certain county roads, and it appearing that said city will place all of said mains or water pipes three feet underneath the surface of the ground, and securely cover the same and will keep the surface of the ground level with ground on either side right of way—  
It is ordered that said City of Enterprise shall have the right to excavate, lay and maintain mains or water pipes in, upon and across the county roads of Wallowa county, mentioned in its application, dated May 7, 1909.

In the matter of appointing a county physician for the ensuing year:  
Dr. E. T. Anderson appointed for the year ending May 1, 1910, at a salary of \$150 a year, and it is further ordered that said Dr. E. T. Anderson is to attend to any and all cases of a medical nature that are declared county charges by the county court, and should any be found to require a surgical operation said county physician shall perform said operation at a reasonable price; and it is further ordered that all county physicians is to furnish all medicine for county charges.

In the matter of W. H. Decker, a county charge:  
It appearing to the court that W. H. Decker has ample means of support at this time, it is ordered that he be and hereby is discharged from receiving any further aid of the county.
