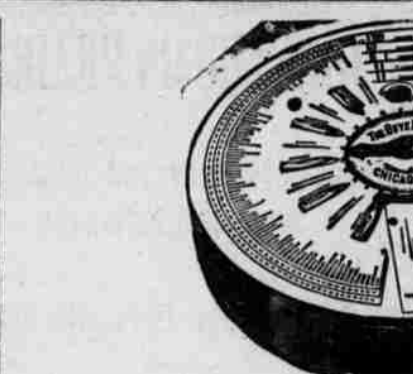

This will give the club an opportunity to furnish 800 inquiries with ordinary every-day unvarnished information regarding our city and our resources that could be given by no reasonable amount of letter writing.

While specially prepared booklets, circulars and other commonly used means of advertising a community are good, there is always the danger of giving the recipients of such matter the feeling that our drawbacks are glossed over and our advantages exaggerated.
