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# RAIN STOPS FIRST GAME.

Rain stopped the first game at the end of the third innings Thursday, the players and spectators being drenched to the skin by a heavy downpour. It rained off and on all day but cleared off a little about 3 o'clock and announcement was made a game would be played. Over 200 spectators were present when Umpire Miller called play at 4 o'clock. The base paths, the batter's box and shortfield was very muddy. No rain fell the first inning and the first three Union batters failed to touch Blyeu's puzzling curves. Cline for Union was wild giving Marvin and Bauer base on balls, but he was saved by a lucky catch of a fly by Nodine. A drizzling rain started and the game turned into a farce, but was continued in hopes the rain would cease. Instead it came down harder and harder until everybody was satisfied to quit at the end of the third. The downpour prevented good playing and neutralized Blyeu's pitching, so that on wild throws, passed balls, with a lucky Texas leaguer mixed in, Union made 4 scores in the second, and another in the third on two short hits. Enterprise batted in a run in the second. The features of the piece of a game were two fine running catches by Pace in center field and a splendid throw to homeplate from right field by Bauer.
