FORMER RESIDENT DROWNED

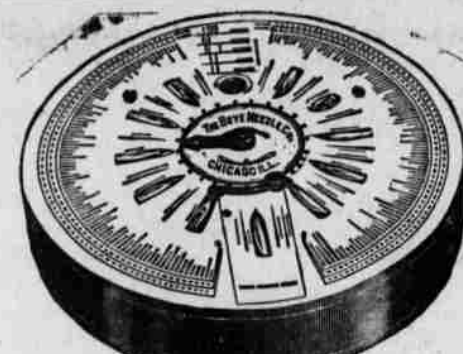
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the location of Mr. King's home, and that boat riding was quite often a pastime of Mr. King. The message said the body had not been recovered.
