PETITION FOR WAGON ROAD UP WEST FORK

T. B. Adams, the well known miner and prospector, was in town Saturday circulating petitions, one to the Forestry bureau and the other to the county court. The former asked that the government trail from the falls eight miles up the west fork of the Wallowa be made into a wagon road, over which supplies food, stone and mineral could be hauled. The petition to the court asked that body to aid in the construction of said road.

Mr. Adams states there are several claims up there that would be come paying producers if this road was built. Both petitions were generally signed, over 180 signatures being secured up to Saturday noon.

R. P. Stubblefield was circulating Saturday a petition to the Forestry bureau, asking for a rearrangement of the Wallowa National forest boundaries, taking out of the reserve land on which there is no timber, thus opening it for agricultural and grazing purposes. This petition was also very generally signed.

WILL RUN EXCURSION TO MINAM AND LAKE

From La Grande Star. The representatives of four orders of railway employees who returned yesterday from Joseph were not very favorably impressed with the idea of running the excursion to Joseph because the picnic ground is five miles from the end of the track and that means a long day with the round trip of 160 miles by rail. There are some very fine camping places along the Minam and there some of the men wanted to go. They recognized, however, the strong desire of the Joseph people to have the excursion come there and a compromise was sought.

Last night the representatives of the men met with J. H. O'Neil, traveling passenger agent, and it was agreed to run a "split" excursion to Minam and Joseph. The rate to Minam is to be \$1.50 and to Joseph \$2.50 for the round trip. The date agreed on is June 20.

It is planned to make a long day of it and not leave Joseph till after 1 o'clock. The Joseph people will provide teams for the five-mile drive to the picnic grounds and return. People must take lunch.

(b) Geography—State Course Study: Redway and Hinman's Natural School Geography.
(c) History—List of topics from History Outline in State Course of Study and Current Events.
(d) Language—Buehler's Modern English Grammar, no diagramming.
(e) Reading—The teacher will send to the County Superintendent the applicant's class standing in reading, which shall be taken by such superintendent as the applicant's standing on the subject.
(f) Spelling—Eighty per cent from Reed's Word Lessons, and twenty per cent, from manuscript in Language.
(g) Writing—Specimens of penmanship as indicated in copied matter and from manuscript in Language.
