In the matter of the road petition of Bird Sarrett et al.

This matter came to be heard at this time on the report of the Board of County Road Viewers for a second reading, as provided by law, said report being in words following to-wit:

To the Honorable County Court: We, the undersigned board of County Road Viewers, appointed by the Honorable Court, to view, survey and lay out a county road as prayed for in the petition of Bird Sarrett and others, beg leave to report:

That pursuant to said order we met at the beginning of the proposed road on the 4th day of June 1909 the same being the time and place fixed by said order for the meeting of the undersigned Board of County Road Viewers and took to our assistance John G. Wray and Luther Trump as chain bearers and Bird Sarrett as marker and proceeded to view, survey and lay out said road as prayed for in said petition, as near as in our opinion a good road can be made at a reasonable expense, taking into consideration the utility, convenience and inconvenience and expense which will result to individuals as well as the public, if such road shall be established and opened.

The said road was surveyed under our directions, and the same was conspicuously marked throughout, the corners and distances thereon noted, and all trees on the line of said road were marked on each of the sides thereof corresponding with the direction of said road, with three notches cut through the bark and one inch into the wood, and all trees adjacent to the said line of said road were plainly blazed on the side facing said road.

The beginning and termination of said road and the termination of each mile and intermediate points have been marked in the manner provided by law, as will more fully appear by the certified return of the surveyor of said road, which is hereunto attached and made a part of this report.

That in our opinion the said proposed road should be established for the following reasons:

It makes much easier grade than old road and accommodates more people and the traveling public.

The portion of the old road sought to be vacated contains grades as high as 18.7 per cent. The steepest grade on the proposed change is 6.5 per cent.

No damages claimed and none allowed.

And said report of the board of county road viewers having been publicly read in open court on two several days of the present term of the court, and it appearing to the court that said board of road viewers report favorably thereon and recommend that said proposed road be established as a county road and be declared as a public highway and all the proceedings according to law, and no remonstrance or claim for damages having been filed herein, and there having been no cause shown why this proposed road should not be declared a public highway and ordered open according to law, and the court being satisfied from the report of the board of county road viewers that such road will be of public utility; the report of this viewers being favorable thereto, and all the files and records of said proceedings having been submitted to the district attorney, who has advised this court as to the legality of said proceedings, it is therefore considered and ordered by the court that the report of the board of county road viewers be placed on record in this journal, and that said proposed road be declared a public highway of Wallowa county, Oregon, and ordered opened up and placed in repair for travel according to law.
