TWO SAD TRAGEDIES IN LINEBARGER FAMILY

From La Grande Star. At 2:30 Monday, July 19, the funeral of Oscar Linebarger, the deaf mute who died in the Salem insane asylum Saturday evening, was held in the undertaking parlors, the Rev. S. W. Seemann, officiating. The interment was made at the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

It will be remembered that Oscar Linebarger was in the Grande Ronde hospital from the 7th to the 12th of July afflicted with a strange malady that proved to be a case of insanity, and that this trouble was the result of a beating that the young man received at the hands of robbers near

Joseph.

This is the second calamity that has taken place recently in the Linebarger home. About sixteen months ago Harold Linebarger, a young man of some twenty-four years, was out on the mountain side near his home in Ladd Canyon. In some way he lost his footing and fell over a cliff. Not being able to gain a holding, he went crashing down the mountain side, landing finally a broken, bleeding form in which but little life was left. He died soon after.

The Linebarger family owns a summer resort in Ladd Canyon. There is much sympathy felt for them in this their second great bereavement.

CROPS AND CATTLE LOOK FINE ON THE CHESNIM
