THE COAST HOG.
 The Spokane rate decision, while it is not as broad as it should be, helps the intermountain region some. It will help a great deal more in the future if the Portland, Seattle and San Francisco hogs keep up their yawp about being entitled to the same or better rates from the east than towns in the interior from two to five hundred miles nearer the coast shipping points.

The plea of the Coast hogs, who have fattened for years on over-payments by people in the Inland Empire is that because of water competition they are entitled to a less rate than Spokane or Baker City. This plea is absolutely without equity.

To meet water competition, the railroads make say a rate of \$15 from Portland. If they are hauling the commodity at a profit at that rate then every point east of Portland is justly entitled to a less rate. There cannot possibly be any ifs and about that.

If the railroads hauling that commodity from Chicago to Portland at \$15 do so at a loss, then somebody is digging down in his pockets and making up that deficit. The people between Portland and the Rocky mountains have been doing that digging for a good many years when they had to pay on goods shipped from Chicago the coast rate plus the local rate from Portland back to the interior town. But the people here are tired of thus helping to fatten the Coast hogs, who are now putting up a big howl to keep their unfair advantage.

If the railroads can't meet water competition to the Coast on Eastern shipments without loss, then the railroads shouldn't try. They haven't any right to rob Peter to pay Paul.

If water transportation is such a tremendous boon to Portland and Seattle, let them get their goods by water. If the Coast jobbing houses have such a big "natural" advantage over Spokane, what are they howling about.

The truth seems to be the Spokane houses will get all the trade if given the just and equitable railroad rates they are entitled to.

POLITICS IN OREGON.
 Politics in Oregon during the coming fifteen months will not be a contest between Democrats and Republicans. Mind that. The fight now on and that will grow in intensity and fierceness until November, 1910, is a struggle between those who believe the people should rule and those who want this state run by a political gang that gets its orders and its money from interests with axes to grind.

In other words it is democracy vs. plutocracy.
 The forces of the latter are already organized. Every interest is in it, from the public service corporations to the brewing and liquor combines. Their organ, the Oregonian, has begun the battle and in its well known hypocritical way is pretending it wants to get good men nominated by means of a recommending "Assembly." By "good men" it really means men who are satisfactory to the bosses and corporations.

It is time, the other side, Republicans and Democrats, organized, even to the extent of starting a new party if necessary.

Every people's power law thus far secured in Oregon should be held at all hazards.

The testimony of three or four local men who have made a personal examination of the Flathead and Coeur d'Alene reservations, is that

nine-tenths of the land is no better, and by far the largest part of it is not as good as government land right here in Wallowa county still open for settlement. The only explanation for the tremendous rush at the gambling feature connected with the filing. Most men like to take a chance.

If Merchant Jones chanced off a \$5 cent scarf pin and this paper mentioned the fact, the postoffice department wouldn't allow that issue to go through the mails. The government itself however conducts the biggest kind of a lottery when it chances off millions of acres of reservation land. That's all right of course, and highly moral because the government does it.

Since the Republican party kept its pledge and started the postal savings banks the people have a safe—What! No postal banks? No pledge kept? That was the matter? Oh! I see. Ulrich and Cannon are the bosses of the Republican party. Taft is nobody, and nobody cares what he says.
