RECORDING BUSINESS AT HIGH WATER MARK

July is counted among the dulllest months of the year in the recorder's office, but showing how the transfers and kindred business in this county is rapidly increasing the receipts for recording in Clerk Boatman's office during July were \$297.10, the highest ever known except last March, when the total was about \$3 more.

The total receipts in Clerk Boatman's office last month were \$431.60.

On August 5, there were 41 instruments filed for record, including 31 patents.
