Hotchkiss, The iew firm takes over the sheep, 4900 head, recently bought by Litch and Hotchkiss of Hayes Kernan, and the 1800 sheep and 1280 acres of land bought a few days ago from Frank Kernan by Litch and Funk.

The exact figures on the sheep are not given out but the Hayes Kernan deal involved over \$19,000, Frank Kernan sheep the land sold for over \$27,000 or a total of over \$46.000






