These towns are becoming parties with Spo kane in the big suit that is to be heard to determine the justice of the demands made by Spokane, and which were partially decided in he favor a few months ago. If Spokan wins in the big hearing, all town that join in the suit will surely be named as beneficiaries of the lower rates as well as Spokane.

A Milion Dollars a Year.

If the Inland Empire had termina rates its freight bill on merchandise shipped from the east would be cu down \$1,000.000 a year. In the last 24 years the people of the Inland Em pire have paid out, at a conservative calculation, \$15,600,000 in excessive rates on shipments from the eas alone.

If it should cost Spokane \$100,60 to carry to sicce sful completion it fight before the interstate commerce commission the cost would be but a raction of what this city pays ever; year in excessive treight rates.

But the sums a tually paid in ex cess of reasonable charges are only a small part of the real cost of un just rates levied upon this city and the surrounding country. It is 400 miles nearer the eastern markets and fac tories; has the greatest railroad system west of the Missouri river, and if freight rates had been right it would be the largest city in the state today.

Walla Walla, Wenatchee, Pasco, Colfax, Pendleton, Baker City, and other interior towns have all had heir growth re a ded by the injustice of excessive freight rates. And this is also true of all other inand cities west of Denver.

At last vic.ory and justice seem lear at hand. The interstate comnerce commis ion has decided that reight rates to al interior points ire excessive, and in the Spokane ase decis on laid down a principle of rate revision for the railroads to Lopt. But the railroads, reluctant o give up a part of their excessive arnings, have brought forward a cheme of revised rates that does ot square with the commission's deislon, and they are using every rtifice to hoodwink the public, deeive the commission and cheat the

nterior. If the large interests of Spokane vill provide the means needed to tinch the decision the long fight will oon end in victory. It may be ecessary to delend the decision in ne courts, and some time and money vill surely be required to complete he application of the commission's indings; but all that expense and ffort, with all that has gone before. vill be a trifle compared with just reight rates-41,000,000 saved each ear, and the profits and payrolls of hundreds of new factories.
