This matter came to be heard at this time on the report of the Board of County Road Viewers for a second reading, as provided by law, said report being in words following to-wit:
To the Honorable County Court above named:
We the undersigned Board of County Road Viewers, appointed by the honorable court, to view, survey and lay out a county road as prayed for in the petition of F. C. Shafer and others, beg leave to report:
That pursuant to said order we met at the beginning of the proposed road on the 25th day of July, 1909, the same being the time and place fixed by said order for the meeting of the undersigned Board of County Road Viewers and took to our assistance L. M. Cook and D. D. Brock as chain bearers, and F. C. Shafer as marker, and proceeded to view, survey and lay out said road as prayed for in said petition, as near as in our opinion a good road can be made at a reasonable expense, taking

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into consideration the utility, convenience and inconvenience and expense which will result to individuals as well as the public, if such road shall be established and opened.
The said road was surveyed under our directions, and the same was conspicuously marked throughout the corners and distances thereon, and all trees on the line of said road were marked on each of the sides thereof corresponding with the direction of said road, with three notches cut through the bark and one inch into the wood, and all trees adjacent to the said line of said road were plainly blazed on the side facing said road. The beginning and termination of said road and the termination of each mile and intermediate points have been marked in the manner provided by law, as will more fully appear by the certified return of the survey of said road which is herewith attached and made a part of this report.
That in our opinion the said road should be established for the following reasons:
It is needed by the adjacent settlers and the public.
We consider that the sw $\frac{1}{4}$ sw $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 15 twp. 23 r. 44e W. M. claimed by B. B. Boyd will be rendered less valuable to the amount of \$100.
We consider that the w $\frac{1}{2}$ nw $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 15 twp. 23 r. 44 E. W. M. claimed by J. Hays will be rendered less valuable by the establishment of the proposed road, to the amount of \$150.00.

E. Fine and L. S. Van Peit as chain bearers and proceeded to view and survey out said road as prayed for in said petition.
That in our opinion the said proposed road should not be established for the following reason:
The point of termination according to the petition appears to be in two or three different places.
