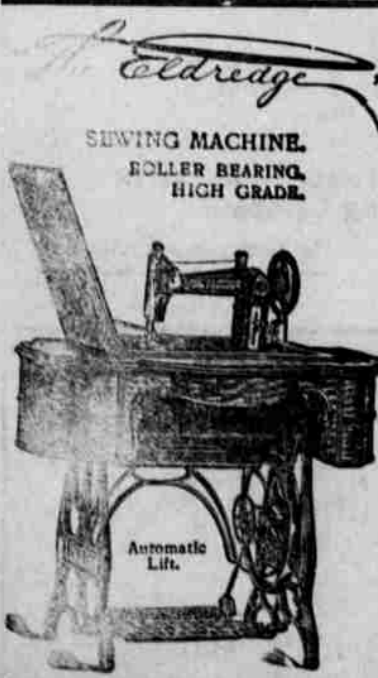
"I believe I read of it," stammered the impudic author, slipping his hands into his pockets.
