## WOMEN ORGANIZE FOR CIVIC UPLIFT

FORM ENTERPRISE IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE WITH OVER FIFTY MEMBERS.

The woman's auxiliary of the Commercial club met at the court house Tuesday evening, March 29, and formed a permanent organization under the name of the Enterprise Improvement League. Constitution and by-laws were adopted and officers elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, Mrs. Carl Roe; vice president, Mrs. C. M. Lockwood; secretary, Mrs. B. B. Boyd; treasurer, Miss Alta Davis; board of directors, Mrs. A. F. Poley, Mrs. W. R. Holmes, Mrs. W. H. Graves, Mrs. Fred Falconer, and Mrs. S. L. Burnaugh.

The league will meet the first Monday evening of each month at 8 o'clock sharp, the next meeting being Monday evening, April 4, at the old court house.

The aim of the organization as stated in the preamble is to improve and beautify the city and to that end the board of directors was instructed to meet with the city council at its next regular meeting and ask that an order be issued for the immediate clean-up of Main street. It will also request that a day be set apart when all residents and property owners will be required to observe the annual spring outdoor clean-up.

Many plans were discussed and much interest shown. The secretary reported more than 50 names enrolled and a number were added at this meeting. All ladies of the town and vicinity are requested to join the league. There is no membership fee, only co-operation in the work being asked of the members.

Mr. Robinson and his bride, then Miss Della Johnston, were schoolmates at Fayetteville, and had not seen each other for ten years until Saturday, March 26, when she arrived at Wallowa with her mother, Mrs. Sarah Johnston, and her little daughter, Glennie Wilson. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson will make their home on a ranch seven miles east of Wallowa.

### DEATH RECORD.

Guy Frederick Cramer, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Cramer, died at the family home in this city Wednesday morning, March 30, at 4:15 o'clock, aged 13 years, nine months and eight days. He had been ill for 10 weeks suffering from yellow jaundice that resulted from an attack of pneumonia last winter. Lately he had been improving and the day before he died was considerably better, and slept well that night until 2 o'clock, when he awoke in great pain. The last hour he was unconscious.

Funeral will be held some time Friday, the hour depending on the arrival of relatives.

The deceased was born seven miles north of Wallowa June 22, 1896, and lived in this county all his short life. Up to the time of his illness last winter, he attended the Enterprise public schools. ### PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COURT, MARCH TERM

#### Second Judicial Day. (Continued.)

In the matter of granting a franchise to the Forest Service of the United States to construct a telephone line:

Franchise granted said Forest Service to construct, maintain and operate complete electric telephone system along the public highway from city of Wallowa to cabin on Sled Springs Station, a distance approximately of 24 miles; said cabin being located in Sec. 26, Twp. 3 N., R. 44 E; said franchise to hold until otherwise ordered by court, it being understood that the line shall be constructed in such manner as to do as little damage as possible to said road, and that where the wires cross the road they shall be placed and strung not less than 20 feet high from said road.

Court adjourned until March 19, 1910.

Saturday, March 19, 1910. In the matter of receiving bids and letting a contract for the furnishing of wood for the court house and high school:

Contract awarded to W. T. Bell of Enterprise, Oregon, as the lowest and best bidder, he to furnish the court house with 50 cords of four-foot wood at \$5.50 per cord, and the county high school with 75 ricks at \$2 per rick.

Enterprise has been asked to place a baseball club in a Class D league composed of Boise, Baker City, La Grande and Enterprise.
