

CITY ELECTION OFFICIAL COUNT

RACE BETWEEN J. A. BURLEIGH
AND W. H. GRAVES IS A
CLOSE ONE.

As a result of the regular city election held Tuesday, May 3, J. A. Burleigh was chosen mayor to succeed Mayor Mayfield now closing out the term. The race, however, between J. A. Burleigh and W. H. Graves, contestants for the mayorality honor, was closely run, Mr. Burleigh winning by 1 vote. The race for city recorder, between W. E. Taggart and C. M. Lockwood was also a very close one, Mr. Lockwood winning by 14 votes.

JOSEPH LOSES TO THIS CITY IN BALL GAME

COUNCIL MEETING NIGHT OF MAY 2

BILLS ALLOWED AND OTHER MUNICIPAL MATTERS PASSED
UPON BY BODY.

The city council met in regular session Monday night last, in the regular meeting room in the office of W. E. Taggart. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Bridge Discussion.
The council discussed at some length the matter of streets and bridges. The street committee reported that they had looked over the bridges referred to them at the last meeting, and that they had had Mr. Marks put in a retaining wall to the bridge on River street. The matter of repairing the bridges on Depot street, River street and Residence street, was discussed fully, and the entire proposition referred to the street committee with power to act.

It was moved and seconded that the council meet Wednesday night to canvass the vote cast at the regular city election Tuesday. Carried.

City Recorder Taggart reported having seen T. R. Akins relative to the deed to the city reservoir site, and that Mr. Akins stated he was ready to sign the deed just as soon as the mayor and city recorder would sign the agreement granting Mr. Akins the surplus water from the reservoir. This was discussed and the matter concluded, the council expressing the desire to have the mayor and recorder close the affair in accordance with the previous agreement.

Marshal Hug reported that the city ditch was repaired and placed in operation.

The matter of extending the water mains was referred to Marshal Hug.

On motion to adjourn the body stood adjourned to meet in special session Wednesday night, when the city vote was canvassed.

Grouse Gleanings Of Daily Events

Body of Frank Russell is Not Yet
Recovered From Little Salmon
River.

Grouse, April 28—The weather has been fine the last 10 days for farming on all the lower bench lands, while the higher lands on the Grouse flats are too wet for cultivation in the sage and draws. It is raining at this writing which will continue to hinder the farming progress.

The fruit prospect is fine. All late varieties are in full bloom and it is hoped that the danger of a late frost has past.

Up to this time no trace of the body of Frank Russell, drowned Sunday in the Little Salmon, has been found. The river has been lined

with a searching party. His father is in deep distress and has the sympathy of the entire community.

The sheriff of Asotin county was at this place a few days ago in pursuit of two horse thieves. The writer has not learned of their arrest. Five head were taken off the range in lower Paradise, forced across the Grande Ronde river, in the neighborhood of Hansons Ferry, and through the settlement, some twenty miles to the Salmon river. The river was part-fording and they were compelled to make a halt. They remained out a few days and their grub was all consumed and they were forced to come in for something to eat, leaving the horses on strange range. They soon began to make their way in the direction of their old range and got back into the settlement and were all recovered by the owner at this place. The parties who stole the horses were employed by the owner to assist him to recover the stolen property, and the two men left as soon as the property was recovered.

John M. Silver has put in a new ferry at Troy which puts the mail on schedule time again. John M. and D. A. Silver started to Enterprise and La Grande on a business trip this morning; they will be out several days.

A new telephone company was organized last Saturday in the neighborhood of Hansons Ferry, Wash., for the purpose of running a new line from Anatone by Hansons Ferry and on to Grange, to connect with the north end line. One hundred and fifty dollars was paid in and as much more on subscriptions. The line will be 25 miles in length.
