In sentencing Henry Wright to serve a term of 30 days in the county jail, Dave Lane 20 days in the same bastille, and George Wright to 30 days in jail and a fine of \$250, all for "bootlegging," Judge Knowles recommended that the prisoners be put to work for the county, cleaning up the rubbish around the new court house grounds. The judge called attention to the law permitting the county court to work prisoners in its custody. The recommendation of Judge Knowles is commended upon and applauded by all who have heard of it. It gives the county recourse to turn an otherwise dead loss into something like remuneration.

WALLOWA COUNTY HIGH WINS TRACK MEET

25 Points Ahead of Nearest Competitor, Joseph.

BIGGEST CROWD EVER IN THE CITY

That Wallowa County High School boys were well trained by their instructors in athletics went into evidence when that school cleaned up the board in the track meet held in Enterprise last Saturday. Wallowa County High won out 25 points in the lead over Joseph, the nearest and hardest competitor in general averages.

Big Crowd Here.

As was stated last Wednesday, the track meet drew the people. According to the popular estimate there were more people attending the meet than attended the horse show here, some weeks previous. One gentleman estimates the attendance as the biggest crowd ever entertained in Enterprise. In the County Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Wallowa.

First Judicial Day,
Wednesday, May 4, 1910.

Be it remembered, That at regular term of the county court of the state of Oregon, for the County of Wallowa, begun and held at the court house in the city of Enterprise in said county and state, on Wednesday, the 4th day of May, A. D. 1910, the same being the first Wednesday in said month and the time fixed by law for holding a reg-

ular term of said court, when were present:

Hon. J. B. Olmsted, county judge; Sam Litch and W. G. Locke, county commissioners; W. C. Boatman, clerk; Edgar Marvin, sheriff.

The following proceedings were had to-wit:

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by T. K. Edgmond, et al:

Viewers' report read first time and continued for second reading. In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by O. F. Mays, et al: Viewers' report read first time and continued for second reading. In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by Walter Boner, et al:

Viewers' report read first time and continued for second reading. In the matter of appropriating money for the Jonez Tramp road:

Now at this time the court considered the matter of appropriating money for Jonez Tramp road, and after fully considering the matter it is hereby considered and ordered that \$200.00 be and the same is hereby appropriated, and the clerk is ordered to draw a warrant in favor of Jonez Tramp for the amount.

In the matter of the resignation of W. J. Hammack, supervisor of Road District No. 3:

Now at this time, W. J. Hammack presents the court with his resignation as supervisor of Road District No. 3, and after the court fully considered the same,

It is hereby considered and ordered that his resignation be, and the same is hereby accepted.

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by John Anthony, et al:

Now at this time the matter came on to be heard, and after being fully considered by the court,

It is hereby considered and ordered, that the same be continued. In the matter of employing a janitor for the court house:

Now at this time this matter came on to be heard, and after the court being fully advised in the matter, it is hereby considered and ordered that Charles Givannoni be employed at the pleasure of the court at a salary of \$60.00 per month and be paid the same as the county officials.

In the matter of appointing a county physician and health officer for the ensuing year:

Now at this time the court considers the matter of appointing a county physician and secretary of board of health, beginning with May 1, 1910, and ending with May 1, 1911, and after being fully advised in the matter,

It is hereby considered and ordered that Dr. E. T. Anderson be appointed county physician and secretary board of health at a salary of \$26.50 per month, and it is further ordered that said Dr. E. T. Anderson is to attend to any and all cases of medical nature that are declared county charges by the county court, and should any be found to require a surgical operation said county physician shall perform said operation at a reasonable price. It is further ordered that said county physician is to furnish all medicines for county charges.

Whereupon court adjourned until tomorrow morning.

REPORT OF GRANDJURY.

In the Circuit Court of the State of

Oregon for Wallowa County.

In the matter of the final report of the Grand Jury:

To the Hon. J. W. Knowles, Judge of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Wallowa County:

We, your Grand Jury, having completed our labors, beg leave to submit this our final report.

We have been in session in all five days, and during this time have returned into court nine true bills and three not true bills of indictment.

We have examined the offices of the Sheriff, County Clerk and Treasurer of the county, and find these officers well housed, and when their offices are furnished with the furniture now ordered for them by the County Court, they will in our opinion be models of safety, convenience and comfort, both for the officers and the general public having business to transact therein. We have carefully examined the books kept by the Sheriff and Clerk, so far as our limited time and facilities will permit, and find said books neatly, carefully and correctly kept, and said officers prompt, careful and efficient in the discharge of their duties, and in the keeping of the records of the county. We have examined into the county jail and prison of the county and when the same is finished with the steel cells and furniture now ordered by the County Court therefor, the same will be a safe, sanitary prison, where prisoners can be safely kept and properly cared for. The new court house which has just been completed is a modern, substantial, stone building, as near fire proof as it can be made, contains ample, convenient and a comfortable room for the holding of Court and good, convenient rooms for all the county officers and jury rooms, and when furnished as contemplated by the county court will be all that the people of the county could wish for court-house purposes. This court house is a credit to the public spirit of the county, and to the County Court who had charge of its erection.

We recommend that the court-house grounds be cleaned of its rubbish as soon as convenient, that the grounds be filled in and leveled and seeded down to lawn grasses, that shade trees be planted around the grounds and at suitable and convenient places in the grounds, and that the grounds be improved generally to harmonize with the court house building itself, and in the doing of this work we recommend that persons serving terms in the county jail be employed therein.

We especially desire to commend our efficient sheriff for his industry and work in the collection of the taxes of the county, and especially in collecting back taxes due the county, and in the manner in which he and his deputies have worked upon these delinquent tax rolls, collected all that is possible to collect, and in this manner saved to the county thousands of dollars.

We further find that while the county school superintendent has a good, comfortable room in the court house, that he has not proper furniture, especially in the way of files for his papers and records and we therefore recommend that the county court immediately procure for his office all necessary files for the safe and orderly keeping and filing away of the papers and records of his office.

We desire to thank Your Honor for the prompt, careful and conscientious manner in which you have dispatched the business of this term of court, and for your uniform courtesy to the Grand Jury, the attorneys appearing before you and their clients. These matters are in the interest of the fair impartial administration of justice and have our hearty approval.

We desire to thank the district attorney by appointment for this term of court, T. H. Crawford, and the deputy, Mr. Dill, for the manner in which they have aided us in the discharge of our duties, and the sheriff, his deputies and other county officers for the willing aid they have given whenever called upon.

And now having finished our work for this term of court we request that we may be discharged and allowed to return to our homes.
