wheat land on earth, and in the best hard wheat climate in the world, will be interested in hearing that Wallowa county hill lands receive sufficient rainfall, as a general thing, to raise a bumper crop of wheat yearly. There are years here, just as there are years in the Illinois corn belt, when the crop varies from the preceding or the succeeding crop; but generally speaking the hill land, without irrigation, can produce winter wheat without summer following. This means just twice as much wheat, if it is followed by every wheat grower, and twice as much prosperity and twice as much business volume. Come to Wallowa.

Third Judicial Day.
Friday, May 6, 1910.

Court met pursuant to adjourning when were present as on yesterday. The following proceedings were had:

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by O. F. Mays and others:

Viewers' report read second time and referred to the district attorney for his legal opinion.

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by Walter Boner and others:

Viewers' report read second time and referred to the district attorney for his legal opinion.

In the matter of the proposed road by John McDonald:

Now at this time John McDonald and others present the court with a dedication deed to the public, for the location of a county road, comes on to be heard, and it appearing to the court that the deed is properly executed, and that all of the land is in Wallowa county, state of Oregon, and correctly described and after the court fully considering the same, it is hereby considered and ordered that the viewers view and lay out said road according to law on the day of —, 1910, and of their proceedings make due and legal return to the court.

In the matter of appropriating money for the location of a county road through land belonging to Jack Johnson, at Wallowa, Oregon:

Now at this time this matter comes regularly on to be heard, and after the court being fully advised in the matter, it is hereby considered and ordered that \$350.00 be appropriated for the purpose of purchasing a right of way through land belonging to Jack Johnson for the location of a county road.

In the matter of the East Side addition to the city of Wallowa:

Now at this time the Wallowa Lumber and Manufacturing company by John McDonald, its president, presents the above named plat to the court for its approval and it appearing to the court that the same does not bear the name of any other town or addition in the county, and that the streets are laid out so as to conform to adjoining plats and that all taxes and assessments have been paid and the same has been approved by the county surveyor, H. E. Merryman, and B. F. Miller, county assessor, it is hereby considered and ordered that the same be approved by the court by the name of East Side addition to Wallowa, Oregon, and it is further ordered that the same be filed and recorded in the county records.

There is water power enough flowing right through the center of the city to run all the spindles and wheels of a great manufacturing center.



We, as a school do not deny the existence of disease germs, but do hold that there is not yet sufficient proof to make the theory tenable that they are per se the cause of disease.—Osteopathic Health.

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
