Elgin, to use Caesar's famous expression a little modified, "Come, and seen and done it." Her league team headed by a brass band and several hundred baseball enthusiasts, defeated the Enterprise team by a score of 8 to 4. Then she laughed as only the victor is entitled to laugh—a good natured, jovial, victorious laugh, which we all joined in, promising to defeat them by a good margin in the next game. That is the way with baseball. Enterprise up to the fifth inning had the game well in hand, but a whole lot of things can happen between the end of the fourth inning and the final. In this instance one persistent thing happened several times—about eight times according to the score, which gave Elgin the game.

Up to the fifth inning Enterprise held the lead of two to nothing, and all Enterprise was happy. Elgin was at happy, but hopeful. Then the Elginites got down to brass tacks and began pulling together, and what occurred sank heavily upon the heart of the Enterprise fan.

At that it was an interesting game to watch and was in doubt until the last man was out in the ninth, for the locals were finding Aubin regularly and threatened every time at bat to start a big batting rally. Instead they came back gamely in their own of the seventh, right after Elgin had rolled up five scores, and put two over the pan on a three bagger by Bauer, his second one, and singles by Odle and Bilyeu, aided by Odle's darling steal of home while pitcher Aubin held the ball.

Elgin won the game because that club played the better ball—outfielding, out-running and out-batting the home team. Carter, the ex-Cove player, was at short for Elgin and as lightened the infield up 50 per cent. The Elgins lived up to their reputations as batters and gave Bilyeu the hardest facing he has received in two years. Eleven hits, including two two-baggers and a home run, tell the sad story.

Our boys were hitting Aubin hard enough to win any ordinary game, but could not bunt their hits to any effect except in the seventh inning. Bauer and Bilyeu did the best of Enterprise's hitting, the former slugging out two fine three-baggers, and Bilyeu getting three hits, one of them a double.

The home boys fell down lamentably on their strongest suits—fielding and base running, especially the latter, losing at least two runs by failure to take full advantage of their opportunities and by that most inexcusable of all base ball sins, loafing on the way to first.

Both teams did some fine fielding stunts to offset the errors. In the first inning, after Hooper had grounded out to Pace, Carter reached second on Savage's miff of his long fly to deep left near the foul line. It was an excusable miff as the wind carried the ball uncertainly and Savage only managed to touch the sphere after a hard run. Hallgarth followed with a base hit, and stole second. Two on and only one out but Bilyeu was equal to the occasion and fanned Towner and Aubin, two of Elgin's heaviest hitters. In their half, Enterprise scored twice on Billy Bauer's long three-bagger, Carter's miss of Hug's hot grounder, Hug's steal of second and Christianson's miss of Bilyeu's scorcher through third. That finished the scoring until the fifth inning. Things went along in one, two, three order except Debole gave a foretaste of what he had in his bat by lacing out a single in the fourth after two were out. He died on second. Satisfied by that experiment that he could expect no help from the succeeding batsmen, he came to the plate in the sixth with blood in his eye. Aubin was perched on first by virtue of a neatly placed single, when little Debole with a mighty swing landed on a swift about for a home run to deep right center. He rounded third before Crumpacker reached the ball. This made Elgin's total three as Patten had scored in the previous inning on his single. Russell's two baser, and Bauer's miss of Savage's good throw home after making a splendid catch back of the crowd of Carter's high foul.

In the seventh came the deluge. Russell first up, made a base hit. Hooper followed with a two bagger. Carter drove a little one between

the box and first that Bilyeu fell down trying to field and Russell scored on the poor throw to the plate. Casey French then mused all over an easy grounder by Hallgarth, Hooper and Carter scoring. Towner's fly was taken care of by Savage, but Casey fumbled Aubin's hot one, recovering in time to get his man at first, but allowing Hallgarth to score. Little Slugger Debole cracked out a single, went to third on Bauer's wild throw to stop his steal of second, and scored on Christianson's single. Patten followed with another single but Russell ended the agony by going out, slug to Pace.

That ended Elgin's scoring, but it made eight and eight was good and plenty. How Enterprise came grudgingly in their half of the seventh with two scores was told in a preceding paragraph. Elgin went out in order the rest of the game. Aubin hit Casey French with an lashed in the eighth after two were down. Savage followed with a base hit but Billy Bauer had exhausted his supply of three-baggers, and went out on a little grounder to the pitcher. The score:

Elgin was tickled half to death to win. They were mighty lucky and knew it.

Jimmy Hayes made a fine catch of a high fly from Aubin's bat in the ninth.

Bauer and Hallgarth both caught in big league style.

Aubin was no puzzle but he kept the hits scattered and was strongest in pinches.

Hooper robbed Hug of a base hit by spearing a grass burner within 25 feet of first.

Bauer's miss of Savage's throw was wholly excusable as the crowd hid the thrower and Billy didn't see the ball in time to get in front of it.

Hug, Odle and Pace starred in the fielding line and ate up a half dozen sizzling grounders. Odle's daring steal of home gave the big crowd a fine chance to yell.

The big crowd was orderly and not an unseemly incident marred the game. Butler's splendid umpiring was a big help.

This is the first game in two years that the opposing team batted Bilyeu hard enough to win. This record still leaves him the best pitcher in Eastern Oregon.

Elgin and La Grande came in on a special train. The Elgin team was accompanied by over 200 rooters and the Elgin band, which played a number of pieces. Twenty-seven tickets were sold at La Grande and 250 at Elgin.

HERE LOOKING OVER TIMBER LAND FOR MILL

Peter McGingan registered at the Hotel Enterprise from Tacoma, has been in Enterprise looking over the entire timber lands here in the county. According to report, Mr. McGingan is here in the interest of large timber and saw mill men, and it is understood that a large capacity mill will be put in, north of Enterprise, in the near future. The timber over on the Innaha, it is stated, was considered a little too rough. This, however, is merely report. But it is reported that the timber north of Enterprise was found excellent saw timber, easy of access, and the big capacity mill probably will be put in there. If this is done and the stump lands put upon the market, the north portion of the county will develop rapidly. Settlement will be spurred favorably and the increase in the county's production will be very great.
