BALL GAME TO BE CONTESTED

SUNDAY'S BATTLE AT ELGIN WON BY ENTERPRISE TEAM GENERAL BELIEF.

The standing of the clubs in the Two County league is omitted purposely from today's publication, in that the game of last Sunday, between Elgin and Enterprise, at Elgin, is in dispute and will be brought to the league's management in contest by the Enterprise management. No concession, by way of clubs' standing, will be given until the contest is determined. According to the umpire of the game, Elgin won by a score of 7 to 6. According to the presentations from the Enterprise management, which will contest the game, Enterprise won up to the ninth inning—before the umpire changed his decision on a foul—by a score of 6 to 5.

Matter in Contest.

The point giving rise to the contest, as near as can be ascertained is this: In the ninth inning Elgin had two men out and two strikes and two balls on the batter, with two men on bases—Elgin up. The batter struck a foul fly which landed anywhere from six to ten feet outside the left foul line. The umpire called a foul whereupon Pitcher Blissett motioned the field "never mind he foul." The umpire then, according to the protest, changed his decision and called it fair, whereupon wo scores came in.

It is stated that even the Elgin populace, numbering of course those who were deeply interested in winning the game fairly, stated that he decision was "rank," and that he fly was foul by several feet. Until this contest has been settled the matter should be held in abeyance, as comment is unnecessary and merely tends to strife.

The Joseph-LaGrande game resulted in a score of 10 to 8 in favor of LaGrande.
