### OPPORTUNITY.

Everybody—almost—has said something about "Opportunity." Still Opportunity is a thing that everybody is interested in. It is that peculiar, timely incident in one's life by which individuals ride into competence, for one thing, and into usefulness for another thing. Moreover, everybody wants to be useful. The life cycle that is hedged and forever bounded by just the thought and effort to get a personal stomachful of something to eat, three times a day, three hundred and sixty-five days a year, and for three score years and ten, is not fulfilling the ordinary conception of usefulness. It is not a life even of personal satisfaction. Yet it is precisely what ninety-nine per cent of the people in the congested Eastern states are doing.

In those states an Opportunity goes loose attracts as much furor and general excitement as a loose elephant; and about as many individuals get after it as would get after a loose elephant. Opportunity there doesn't make much noise. Ten thousand hands reach for it before it has time to make much noise. Ten thousand human souls grasp for it, even in anticipation—before the thing comes. And there is the veriest scramble for it once it gets out into what might figuratively be called the general public circulation.

Contrasted to that condition—and that condition is not overstated—is the condition west, and especially the condition in Wallowa county. Here Opportunity is multiplied vastly beyond the number of the inhabitants. Instead of Opportunity's slipping around incognito, as it were, it cries aloud. Instead of persons here running in a mad scramble after a solitary Opportunity, the Opportunities get after the people. Knock on their doors before they are up, and elp mementoes under the threshold for fear of missing somebody.

Although that is more or less figurative, the essential truths are still truths. All the newcomer to Wallowa county, with a little ready money, needs to do is to get his ear down to the ground and listen intelligently; or glue his eye to some piece of average Wallowa county land, and look as if he were looking into the future. In either case he will hear and see Opportunity caught in the very act of crying and beckoning human industry.

Human industry within a single season, backed by a little ready cash, can transform a weed-grown old pasture farm into a paradise of wheat, barley, potatoes, rye, or hay.

These time-old hills, pooh-poohed by some because nobody has ever tried to farm them, only wait, with the patience of eternity for somebody with initiative enough and industry enough to plant wheat and get from forty to sixty bushels an acre from them. And that is Opportunity. Incidentally it is usefulness.

### WORK OF CONGRESS.

The present session of congress, now about to adjourn, has accomplished some good work. True, it has left undone many things it should have done, but every congress does that and we should be thankful for small favors when Cannon and Payne are the bosses.

Not thankful to Cannon and Payne, however, for the good work was done against their wishes and manipulation. Thank goodness the insurgents were strong enough to force a few concessions from the representatives of the interests, so we have the postal savings banks, the new Mexico and Arizona, the railway rate regulation act, and will probably get the withdrawal bill, legalizing the withdrawals of public land conserving forests and natural resources, and possibly in appropriation to complete the irrigation projects now under construction.

For all the foregoing the credit must be given first to the spirit of insurgency, which, in its true analysis, is only a reflection of public opinion made manifest in an effective way. President Taft comes next in the good work for he has courageously battled with the standstillers and reactionaries in and out of congress, and has labored unceasingly for progressive legislation. Taft is censured more or less harshly for sticking by and standing up for the Wickershams, Knoxes and Ballingers, but who wouldn't do the same in his place? To stick by his friend was a prominent fault (or virtue, according to the way you look at it) of Roosevelt. Paul Moron, for instance, Taft has done no more, probably not as much, as Teddy would have done in a similar situation. Maybe, when the fight ceases on these men, they will be given a hint to retire from the cabinet. Let us hope so.

### OPPOSED TO ASSEMBLY.

The Oregonian, in its frantic efforts to imagine support for its "Assembly," says Wallowa county Republicans favor it. There is no warrant for that assumption. Indeed, the evidence is all the other way, and if the machine bosses doubt it now they will be convinced after the votes are counted on the 24th day of next September.

Wallowa Republicans and Democrats are in favor of party organization, and in favor of assemblies or conventions that meet to frame state platforms and effect organization, but not to nominate candidates nor to recommend candidates. Any set of bosses who have a state ticket up their sleeves to get an obedient convention to ratify, will find that out to their sorrow. They will hear something drop on either September 24 or November 8.

The shenny bosses who are getting up the little old assembly to meet in Portland in July, are the worst enemies of the Republican party in Oregon. They are taking a course that will split the party wide open in November.
