**NEWS PARAGRAPHS FROM OTHER CITIES IN OREGON**

The Oregon-California Socialist encampment opened in Klamath Falls Sunday, June 26, with a meeting preliminary to the 10-days' session.

George Ferran, one of the river pirates who with George Burke was accused of numerous thefts along the Willamette river, was convicted at Portland.

Senator Chamberlain's amendment to the sundry civil bill, to appropriate \$15,000 for the Crater Lake road, was cut to \$10,000 on account of the insistence of the house conferees.

The state treasurer's office has received the inheritance tax from the estate of the late Caroline Ladd, amounting to nearly \$14,000. The net value of the estate was \$1,491,194.57.

With the visit of F. L. Knelp, assistant forester, to Portland comes the announcement of a project to make 260,000 acres of land in the Paulina Mountains available for the settlers who are rushing into Central Oregon.

C. L. Hueston of Astoria, who has the contract to build the jetty at the mouth of the Nehalem river, will commence work about July 1. The jetty, when completed, will be about 900 feet in length. This will insure a depth of about 20 feet of water at the bar.

Judge Campbell instructed a jury to return a verdict for the defendant corporation, Pacific University, and its president, W. N. Ferrin, in the case of Fred Hill, a minor, who sued for \$10,000 damages for the loss of an index finger through the discharge of a gopher gun.

Judge H. J. Bean of the circuit court for Morrow county, has affirmed the adjudication of the rights to the use of the waters of Willow creek in that county, arrived at after a full investigation by the board of water control. It is the first full determination of the rights to the waters of a stream under the new water law enacted by the 1909 legislature.

Requests for Senator Bourne's speech poured in last volume in the closing days of the session of congress that it was necessary for him to order additional copies, making 800,000 in all, with provisional requests, not yet passed on by Bourne that make it certain that the total will pass the million mark within another month.

The Oregon railway commission has filed a complaint with the Interstate commerce commission against the Southern Pacific and about 50 other railroads, alleging that less than carload rates from Eastern points to points in Oregon, on the Southern Pacific south of Portland, are excessive in that they exceed the rates in effect prior to March 22, 1910.

After a delay of four or five months, during which the title to over 26,000 acres of land was examined, the syndicate of Portland capitalists which contracted for the immense Crook county ranch of the Baldwin Sheep & Land company last February, formally took title to the property last week. The

consideration involved in the deal was \$450,000, all of which was paid in cash to the former owners.

Declaring the preponderance of public sentiment in Tillamook county is unalterably opposed to the assembly plan, the Tillamook county republican central committee repudiated that method of choosing candidates.

Fifteen-year-old George L. Batchelder, of Hood River, in competition with several hundred other boys from all sections of the United States, has won a prize for constructing the best aeroplane model.

Adjutant-General Finzer has issued orders for the annual encampments of the various bodies of the Oregon National Guard this year. Field artillery, of which there is but battery A in Portland, will be at Cascade, Wash., July 17 and 18, for target practice with the field guns. Coast artillery will go into encampment at Fort Stevens from September 1 to 15, in connection with the regular army artillery force on duty with the heavy guns guarding the mouth of the Columbia. The 20 companies of infantry have been ordered to get ready to go to American Lake, Washington, for maneuvers from August 8 to 11, in conjunction with the regular army forces that are to be mobilized there.

**Right of Way Fund Sure.**

**THE DALLES.**—The committee which has been soliciting funds to buy a right of way into this city for the Portage road has secured \$2000 of the \$2300 necessary. Work on the extension will be commenced at once. Much material is at hand.

**The Light of the Stars.**

Vast endeavors have been made to estimate the light of the stars. In the northern hemisphere Argolander has registered 324,000 stars down to the nine and a half magnitude, and with the aid of the best photometric data Agnes M. Clerk's "System of the Stars" gives the sum of the light of these northern stars as equivalent to 1440 of full moonlight, while the total light of all stars similarly enumerated in both hemispheres, to the number of about 900,000, is roughly placed at 1-180 of the lunar brightness. The scattered light of still fainter celestial bodies is difficult to compute. By a photographic method Sir William Abney rated the total starlight of both hemispheres at 1-100 of full moonlight, and Professor Newcomb from visual observations of all stars at just 728 times that of Capella, or 1-89 of the light of the full moon.

It is not certain, however, that the sky would be totally dark if all stars were blotted out. Certain processes make the upper atmosphere strongly luminous at times, and we cannot be sure that this light would be totally absent.—Harper's Weekly.

Its fishing fleet is an imposing one and its best seen at night, when the boats are drawn up on the beach. Each has a number, and these are painted on the sides in such large figures that they can be read at a considerable distance. At night when the fishermen begin to come to land the women of the village walk down to the beach with their knitting in their hands to meet them. They wear their wooden shoes, some of which are made to look especially clean by an application of whitening, and they make a merry clatter as they go. Industry is characteristic of the women of Holland in all walks of life. They must always be at work of some kind, and it would seem as if more knitting needles must be used in Holland than in any other country in the world.—E. J. Farrington in Interior
