MORE YOUNG GROUSE THAN FOR MANY YEARS PAST

W. E. Hayes, a well known rancher living on the Slope and running cattle down on the Innaha in the Horse Creek district, arrived in Enterprise Friday night from his stock range. Mr. Hayes states that in the eleven years he has been on the range in the Innaha country he never has seen the young grouse so plentiful. He has seen hundreds of hens and each has had from eight to as many as fifteen chickens. This report will be received with joy by the hunters who enjoy not only the hunt but young grouse meat. The grouse season opens with that of the native pheasant season, August 15 and continues to November 15. That is the season for Wallowa, Union, Umatilla, Grant and Baker counties in this state. Just what the bag limit for grouse is the abstract of game and fish laws at hand does not specifically give, but sage hens and cocks, prairie chickens, quail and upland birds differ in different counties somewhat, as to the limit of birds one hunter may take in one day or in seven consecutive days.

COUNTY CONVENTION NOTICE.

The Socialist Party of the county of Wallowa is called to meet in County Convention at Local Enterprise Headquarters, at Enterprise, Oregon, on the 31st day of July and the 1st day of August, 1910, for the purpose of nominating a county ticket for Wallowa county, and electing delegates to the State Convention to be held in Portland on the 7th and 8th day of August, 1910.

To explain: The Convention officers legalize the delegates credentials to the State Convention in accordance with the Oregon statutes. The signature of the party, local, officers confirms the election of the Delegates as per S. P. Constitution.

We are advised by Attorney General Crawford that this course of procedure gives us a place on the state ticket without any filing fee. We have the privilege of using one or more pages in the candidates election advertising sheet for the purpose of setting forth our party principles.
