TWO IMPORTANT ITEMS OF THE COMING FAIR.

The Fair Association is arranging to exhibit the colts sired by the horses and jacks of Wallowa like to urge all owners of such horses and jacks to send to the Fair secretary the names of the owners of such colts.

In this connection the association would urge all horsemen to exhibit their horses, in that considerable attention beyond the ordinary will be directed to such horses and jacks through the exhibit of their colts. Another very important matter to every breeder in the county is the stock sale which will be conducted daily, during the entire Fair week, by the association. This will bring breeder and buyer together. The best stock from this county should be placed on exhibit.

The success of the coming Fair, beginning September 26, is being enthusiastically talked about by every one thus far heard from, and it is urged that you "talk Fair" among all your friends.

IMPORTANT SUIT DECIDED.

The case of the United States vs. J. H. Fisher and C. R. Elliott, which has been pending for some time in the U. S. circuit court at Portland, has been decided in favor of the defendants. The suit was brought by the government to cancel a patent for 160 acres of timber land in the Leap neighborhood, on information furnished by W. T. Knapp to the effect that Fisher to whom the patent had been issued, had used his land right for the benefit of Elliott, to whom Fisher afterwards transferred the land. Federal Judge Bean holds that the evidence does not sustain the complaint and has dismissed the suit. Considerable interest was taken in the case by the many acquaintances of the parties involved. There are many similar cases in this part of the state, but upon which no suits have been brought. The government was represented by John McCurt, U. S. attorney, and J. R. Wyatt, assistant, while the defense was attended to by J. A. Fee of Pendleton and D. W. Sheahan, of Enterprise.

RESTORATION LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST

MANY INQUIRIES REGARDING LAND TO BE THROWN OPEN TO SETTLEMENT.

County Clerk W. C. Boatman has received so many inquiries concerning the restoration of the lands in the National Forests that he requests the publication of the following information:

Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington, D. C. July 28, 1910.

ENTERPRISE STATE BANK ORGANIZED

STOCKHOLDERS AND DIRECTORS MEET AND ORGANIZE—OPEN BY OCTOBER 1.

The stockholders of the new Enterprise State Bank met Monday night and elected directors as follows: C. E. Cunningham, President; Velsor National bank, Velsor, Ida; V. C. Hinterman, cashier; Continental bank, Salt Lake; Sam Wade, S. B. Knapp, Sam Litch.

The new bank is capitalized at \$25,000, fully subscribed stock, which will in all probability be increased in the next year.

A meeting of the directors was held the following night and the organization was completed with the election of Sam Wade president and V. C. Hinterman cashier. Mr. Hinterman departed Wednesday morning for Salt Lake to close up his affairs there. He has rented the newly built cottage of Jacob Wagner on North River street, and will return here as soon as possible. The bank will be opened at least by October 1. It will be temporarily located in the Daniel Boyd building, this being chosen because of the large fireproof vault. Negotiations are under way with C. E. Funk for the erection of a fine, modern bank building west of the Jackson & Weaver drug store.

In order to reduce his furniture stock G. I. Ratcliff will hold an auction sale of furniture at his store Saturday, August 27, at 10:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. His stock of musical goods will also be closed out, including violins, guitars, banjos, phonographs, (excepting Edison's), organ, etc. There will also be sold at this time a complete second-hand house-keeping outfit (used less than one year).

Wallowa Pioneer Dies At Turlock

L. C. Cooper, Old Resident of This County, Passes Away at His California Home.

The funeral service of the late Lemuel C. Cooper, whose death was noticed in these columns last week, was held in the M. E. church of Turlock, Cal., Friday, August 5, at 3 p. m. Chaplain C. L. Taylor of the St. Helena Sanitarium, officiated. The attendance of sympathizing friends and acquaintances of the deceased was very large, filling the large church to its fullest capacity. It was estimated that about 400 were present.

A wife, five children, and two brothers mourn his loss. The remains were laid to rest in the Turlock cemetery, the lot having been chosen by the deceased just before his death.

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Excellent music was rendered by a quartet from the Adventist church.

The following obituary was read by Chaplain Taylor:

"Lemuel Cyrus Cooper was born in Marion county, Iowa, Feb. 19, 1856, and died at Turlock, Cal., August 3, 1910, aged 54 years, 6 months and 14 days. The year 1893 found him in Wallowa county, Ore., which year witnessed his marriage on January 18, to Cora A. Harsin of that state. Five children were born to them—Hazel, Lucy, Fred, Kate and Richard. For many years brother Cooper was engaged in the business of cattle raising, but in 1906 he removed to Turlock, where he engaged in farming.

"About four years ago he became interested in religious matters thru the preaching of Elder C. M. Gardner and was baptized. He did not, however, at that time join the church because he believed the habit of tobacco using was not consistent with true Christian profession. But he was finally and instantly delivered from the desire for the weed, and

then it was he entered the communion of the Turlock Seventh-Day Adventist church.

"About one year ago he was taken ill and in December went to the St. Helena Sanitarium for treatment and in January underwent an operation. The operation afforded temporary relief, but later it was known that a malignant growth of the pancreas had developed and that without divine intervention recovery was impossible.

"Notwithstanding, Bro. Cooper was perfectly reconciled. The speaker had frequent conversations with him and was assured that he was ready to go at any time. His only desire for prayer was that the will of God might be done. His one regret was that he had not been more active in his Christian life, and the last few weeks of his life bore ample testimony to the sincerity of his regret. He delighted to speak to the many sympathizing callers at the home about the blessed hope and when alone his time was spent largely in prayer. Certainly he died in the enjoyment of a bright hope, a strong faith, an abounding love, a deep consecration."
