This was effected by repeal of Section 9 of the Reclamation Act, which was done by the Ways and Means Committee of the House, of which Congressman Ellis is a member. He will also show how the Interior Department has construed the Homestead and Timber Land laws off the statute books so that now a man's rights to take up government land are practically worthless, Lafferty is es pecially well versed in this subject and handles it in an interesting man-

On National issues Lafferty is a progressive Republican and stands with Cummits, Dolliver, LaFollette, Murdock and Madison, and against Aldrich, Cannon, Payne, Daizell and the other reactionaries. In local politics he opposes the assembly idea. He is a fighter and if he is sent to Congress he will get things
