HUNDREDS OF HORSES, CATTLE AND OTHER STOCK WILL BE AUCTIONEERED OFF.

The auction sales of high grade horses, cattle and other stock to be held every day of the Wallowa County fair except Monday, bids well to be the biggest thing of the kind ever held in Eastern Oregon. Personal letters have been written to over 100 stock buyers in the Northwest, and a large attendance of outside purchasers seems assured.

The stock offered for sale will include some of the best in Wallowa county and that means the best in all the Northwest, for Wallowa county is second to none in stock—horses, cattle, sheep and swine.

On Tuesday alone over 100 head of high grade Percherons, Clydes and Shires will be offered for sale. They are from the well known stables of E. A. Anderson and George Wagner. That fact is enough to guarantee the quality of the horses, as every horseman in several counties round about knows.

That sale is but a sample of what will be taking place on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday forenoons.
