#### MAINE AND WASHINGTON.

Maine went Democratic because there is no direct primary in Maine. There are as many Republicans in Maine as there were four years ago, and no more Democrats. But many Republicans were sick and tired of being "ruled"; they wanted a hand in the ruling but under the convention-gang-system they had no chance. As a sign of their revolt they voted the Democrat ticket.

Washington was different. The same insurgency as in Maine found by means of the direct primary a chance to make itself heard and felt within the party, so there will be a Republican victory in Washington in November.

The direct primary makes for party stability.

#### WILLING TO RUN.

It is amusing to see how many "prominent" Portland Democrats are willing to run for congress in this district since they heard from Maine. Harry Lane, John Manning and ex-Senator Gearin are mentioned.

We have a Democrat right here in Wallowa county that would make a better congressman than any of them. J. A. Burleigh is the peer

of any Democrat in the state in brains and common sense, and superior to any in oratorical ability.

The Second Oregon district would be known nationally if Burleigh represented it in congress.

Anti-primary writers make a great ado about the vast number of candidates under the direct primary. The field was open in Wallowa county and there's barely enough candidates in both parties to fill the offices. Whether the reason is the prosperity that gives all a good living without office, or because the present officers are so satisfactory, the fact remains there will be but few contests here Saturday.

The assemblyites are dodging statement No. 1 by saying it is not

an issue because there is no United States senator to be elected. What if Bourne or Chamberlain should die? Even office holders have been known to die. The only safe way is to put none but true blue primary men on guard.

Congressman Ellis on his own statement makes a pitiful showing for his many years in congress. Three little public buildings! Nominates Lafferty and the district will have a live man. Besides he is a primary man while Ellis has the assembly tag.

In another column are given the views of Judge Lowell on the way to beat Bowerman, the anti-primary candidate for governor. Dimick is a good man, a true-blue primary man and he will surely be nominated if all primary men vote for him.

The Connecticut Republican convention at Hartford was in great confusion because of so many fraudulent votes cast. Sounds like the old days in Oregon that Bowerman, Ellis & Co. want to go back to.

Scratch an assemblyite and you find a Roosevelt hater. Two met in an office in Enterprise a few days ago, and it was a race between them to see who could cuss the ex-president the hardest.

Oswald West is the logical Democratic candidate for governor. Myers may be a good man, but he is comparatively unknown. West has made good wherever put. His record is splendid.

Every man "recommended" by the Tacoma convention was turned down at the Washington primary. Oregon will do likewise.
