Coos Bay Survey Finished.

Eugene—The Lane County Asset Company has completed its survey on the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad to Glenada. The distance is 61 miles and D. H. Forneri, the engineer in charge, says that the permanent location will reduce the distance to less than 60 miles.

This practically cuts off 20 miles between Eugene and Glenada from the stage route and may reduce the distance from Eugene to Coos Bay to less than 100 miles.

Plan Roads for Crater Lake.

Medford—United States engineers, under the direction of Major L. J. Morrow, chief of the engineering corps, are at work in the Crater Lake national park, laying plans for a complete system of roads and trails. There are three parties in the field making the surveys. It is the intention to make one of the most complete systems of highways that has ever been laid out in a national park.

Last year congress appropriated \$10,000 for the making of a survey of the park, the result the work being the basis on which future appropriations for the improvement of the park will be made.
