**DEMOCRATS MAKE WHIRLWIND TOUR**

**NOMINEES FOR STATE OFFICES VISIT FOUR TOWNS IN ONE AFTERNOON.**

Oswald West Democratic candidate for governor, spent a strenuous day in the valley Wednesday, coming in from La Grande in an auto, spending over an hour at Wallowa, another hour at Lostine, made a speech in the street at Joseph and got supper; then came to Enterprise and delivered an address to an audience that filled the court room. He was accompanied by W. T. Slater, nominee for supreme judge; Hugh McLain, running for railroad commissioner; Turner Oliver, nominee for secretary of state; T. A. Rinehart of La Grande, and R. A. Watson of the Portland Journal.

S. F. Pace, J. A. French, D. W. Sheehan and W. C. Boatman met the visitors at Wallowa and acted as escort in the whirlwind campaign. Mr. French, candidate for representative, spoke at Lostine and Joseph.

Mr. West is not an orator and does not claim to be, but he makes a straightforward sensible talk, and promised a business-like administration as governor, just as he gave as state land agent and is giving as a railroad commissioner. A more extended account of his speech will appear in a later issue.

Mr. McLain, Mr. Slater and Mr. Oliver also made short talks. Mr. McLain spent many years in railroad construction and would be a practical man on the commission. There are no corporation agents to him.

Judge Slater explained the non-partisan judiciary movement. He is a clear, forcible speaker.

**ADJOURNED TERM OF COUNTY COURT**

**LOCAL OPTION ELECTION ORDERED AND PRIMARY BILLS AND CLAIMS ALLOWED.**

Friday, October 7, 1910.

Court met pursuant to adjournment, and the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the petition for and against Prohibition:

Now, at this time the Court considers the matter of the petition on file with the Clerk to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors will be prohibited in the entire County of Wallowa, and it appearing to the Court that said petition contains a sufficient number of signers to order an election to be held, and after the Court fully considering the same, it is hereby considered and ordered that on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 1910, an election will be held to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors will be prohibited in the entire County of Wallowa, State of Oregon.

In the matter of allowing Miscellaneous Bills:

Now, at this time the matter of allowing the miscellaneous bills against the county came on for consideration, and the said bills having been submitted to the Court, and the Court having passed upon and audited each of said bills separately as appears from the signatures of the Court thereon, it is, therefore, considered and ordered by the Court that the said bills be allowed and warrants issue by the County Clerk in payment of the same as allowed in classes and amounts as follows:

**ANTI-PROHIBITION SPEECH BY SMITH**

**ORATOR HEARD BY LARGE AUDIENCE—FIRST OF KIND IN ENTERPRISE.**

Dan Morgan Smith spoke in the opera house, Thursday night, on "Prohibition is Wrong, Morally," to an audience of perhaps 250 people, including many who differ from the speaker on that issue but who gave him a respectful hearing. The speaker was introduced by A. C. Miller, manager of the opera house. Captain Smith is a Georgian by birth but is now a resident of Chicago where he is a prominent lawyer. He is employed by the Greater Oregon Home Rule association of Portland. He says he never drank liquor, but occasionally takes a glass of beer. He is certainly a forcible, eloquent and effective orator. His main argument was that prohibition is a failure in correcting or lessening the evils of the abuse of intoxicants. The dive flourishes more under prohibition than under regulation. He favors drastic regulation, making it obligatory on officers, under penalty of impeachment, to forfeit the license of second offenders. Captain Smith spoke in Wallowa Friday night.
