ANTI-PROHIBITION SPEECH BY SMITH

ORATOR HEARD BY LARGE AUDI-ENCE-FIRST OF KIND IN ENTERPRISE.

Dan Morgan Smith spoke in the opera house, Thursday night, on Prohibition is Wrong, Morally," to an audience of perhaps 250 people, including many who differ from the speaker on that issue but who gave him a respectful hearing. The speaker was introduced by A. C. Miller, manager of the opera house.

Captain Smith is a Georgian by birth but is now a resident of Chicago where he is a prominent lawyer. He is employed by the Greater Oregon Home Rule association of Portland. He says he never drank liquor, but occasionally takes a glass of beer. He is certainly a forceful, eloquent and effective orator

His main argument was that prohibition is a failure in correcting or lessening the evils of the abuse of intoxicants. The dive flourishes more under prohibition than under regulation. He favors drastic regulation, making it obligatory on officers, under penalty of impeachment, to forfeit the licenses of second offriends.
